Paris Style Hint
PARIS, Sept. 26.—Chill Summer weather has made coats one of the most interesting parts of the new collections that are now being shown in Paris.

For the most part, coats for the Winter will be long, but not always reaching to the bottom of the gown. Many three-quarter-length ones are being shown, always straight in line, but with various-fantastic touches.

Coats of Rodier's ziblikasha, in zigzag and quadrille patterns, are cut to display the exquisite richness of the fabrics and their unique patterns to greatest advantage.

Some have shoulder capes, with broken borders woven into the material. In fact, the Directorate collar is to be seen on many of the new coats, some of the models with the double Directorate cape. In opposition to O. O. Alenderfer for mayor Earl Fehl, whose candidacy was filed recently, will also run; and Mary A. Webber for city treasurer, will be opposed by Linnie Hanscom whose candidacy was filed some time ago. It will be remembered that at the last election City Treasurer Webber for re-election won out over Miss Hanscom by 137 votes.

It seems a foregone conclusion that M. L. Alford will have no opposition in running for re-election as city recorder. However, it is understood that the voters back of the Fehl majority candidacy plan to run a partial councilman ticket with him.

MANY CHANGES IN SENATORS MAY BE RESULT ELECTION

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—A decisive change in the personnel of the United States senate is in prospect as one of the most important results of the November presidential elections.

Of the 32 seats to be filled this year, at least eight will hold new personages, it already has been determined.

The primaries mowed into the senate personnel this year as never before. A half dozen familiar heads already have been lopped off and each primary to come holds similar forebodings.

Seventeen Republicans, fourteen Democrats and one Farmer-Laborite are up for re-election. The Democrats, most of whom come from southern states, are favored over the Republicans to retain their chairs.

Of the Republicans Senator Ball of Delaware, Colt of Rhode Island, Elkins of West Virginia, McCormick of Illinois and Sterling of South Dakota must be replaced. Ball failed to get the nomination which was obtained by Coleman T. Dupont. Colt died, Elkins refused to run for re-election. McCormick and Sterling were defeated in primaries in their respective states.

Three Democrats Out
The only three Democrats who are certain not to return are Nathaniel B. Dial, of South Carolina, Robert L. Owen, of Oklahoma, and John K. Shields of Tennessee. All three however come from historically Democratic districts where their successors are certain to be Democrats. Dial and Shields were

defeated in recent primaries. Owen declined to run for renomination.
As the situation lines up the Democrats have an excellent chance to capture the upper house of congress. In West Virginia a Davis landslide might pull in a Democrat to replace Elkins. A stiff fight is being put up against Senator Phipps, the Republican in Colorado. In Maine, Illinois and perhaps Wyoming they think they have a reasonable chance.

The line-up of the present senate stands 51 Republican, 43 Democrats and two Farmer-Laborites. If the Democrats can capture four Republican seats, they can deadlock the senate and control the majority through the two Farmer-Laborites who have not failed to vote with them on every important occasion during the recent session. If they can get more than four they can control an absolute majority.

Up For Re-election
Besides the eight already defeated for re-election, senators up this year for re-election include: Borah, Republican, of Idaho, who is almost certain to come back;

Brookhart, Iowa Republican, who feels sure of returning now that he has obtained the nomination.

Bursary, New Mexico Republican who is powerful in his state. Capper, Kansas Republican who probably will have a walkaway.

Couzens, Michigan Republican who is favored to pull through the stiff fight that is being put up against him.

Edge, New Jersey Republican who is facing a hard situation within his own party in his own state.

Glass, Virginia Republican who is sure to come back if he remains in good health.

Harris of Georgia, Harrison of Mississippi and Heflin of Alabama—all Democrats—who at the present writing seem certain to return.

Magnus Johnson, the Farmer-

Laborite from Minnesota who is a favorite to win in his section.

Keys, Republican of New Hampshire who probably will come back.

McNary, Republican of Oregon who feels safe.

Phipps, Republican of Colorado who may be defeated by Senator Adams, his youthful Democratic opponent.

Ramsdell, Louisiana; Robinson, Arkansas; Sheppard, Texas; Simmons, North Carolina and Stanley of Kentucky, Democrats who are almost certain to return.

Walsh, Mass. Democrat who may pull through the strenuous opposition set up against him.

Walsh, of Montana who is expecting an easy victory and Warren, Wyoming Republican who has long controlled a majority in his state.
