USING THE WASTAGE

When the writer viewed the small enterprise of The Ashland Charcoal and By-Products company, whose officials claim they can, and have made, charcoal and by-products from soft wood sawdust, the remark of one of the Massachusetts visitors recently in our city, "that you are proud today of Oregon, but you won't be in 25 years unless you find a way to use the huge wood wastage of the state," came to mind.

A community, state or nation is like a business—you can not build up if you are merely using up and not making a new supply of the resources which enables the building up.

Henry Ford, that great conservator and builder, immediately saw this wastage when he started to cutting his forest of hard wood timber, and has constructed a million dollar plant for the manufacture of charcoal and by-products from the hard wood wastage.

In this country there is very little hardwood, but there is a huge waste from the soft wood cutting and sawing. The aim of the local company is to conserve this by-product by converting it into charcoal and charcoal by-products.

LACKING OF STATE LOYALTY

A writer in The Portland Journal of Sunday has an article on Oregon and outside produce, with the Oregon spirit contrasted to that found in California, which is as simeon-pure an editorial as could be written and is given in full:

Just what is the reason why the average buyer will persist in purchasing the commodity produced at a distant point in preference to the home article, has always been a most mystifying point in the produce trade.

In California there is a loyalty to the state that is near-religion. There the people stand together for the welfare of the home manufacturer or producer. It is im-

possible to bring Florida citrus fruits to California because that would hurt the industry of the state. While Californians may give reasons galore for their action, one being that the Florida stock is badly infected, still the real big reason is that Florida stock is superior to Californian and authorities are enlisted in the case for the California grower.

Here in Oregon there is a general absence of loyalty to the state's products. Despite the fact that Oregon grows the best potatoes in the country, its population persists in securing the bulk of their needs elsewhere.

The trouble is that the local wholesalers are unwilling to purchase the better quality Oregon stock because it costs a trifle more than the junk from other sections.

WEEK-DAY BIBLE STUDY PLANNED

SALEM, Sept. 29.—"Since in America church and state are separated for all time, an adequate system of education must provide for training the religious nature of childhood, and the plan of the week-day religious school will give such training without doing violence to the faith of the home," according to a statement issued here today by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools.

The proposed plan for conducting the week-day religious school is outlined in the following general statement issued at the state educational department:

"Too many people think of the end of education as being citizenship, parenthood, industrialism or trade.

"Education should be regarded as being the development of man in the full roundness of character in all beauty of body, of intellect, of heart, of will. The end of education must be character, based on right habits of moral conduct.

"A good system of education will not only develop the mental and the physical man, but the spiritual as well. Without giving spiritual values along with the mental and physical, a system of education is materialistic, and will fail to advance in civilization the people in it, and prepare them for the highest form of self-government.

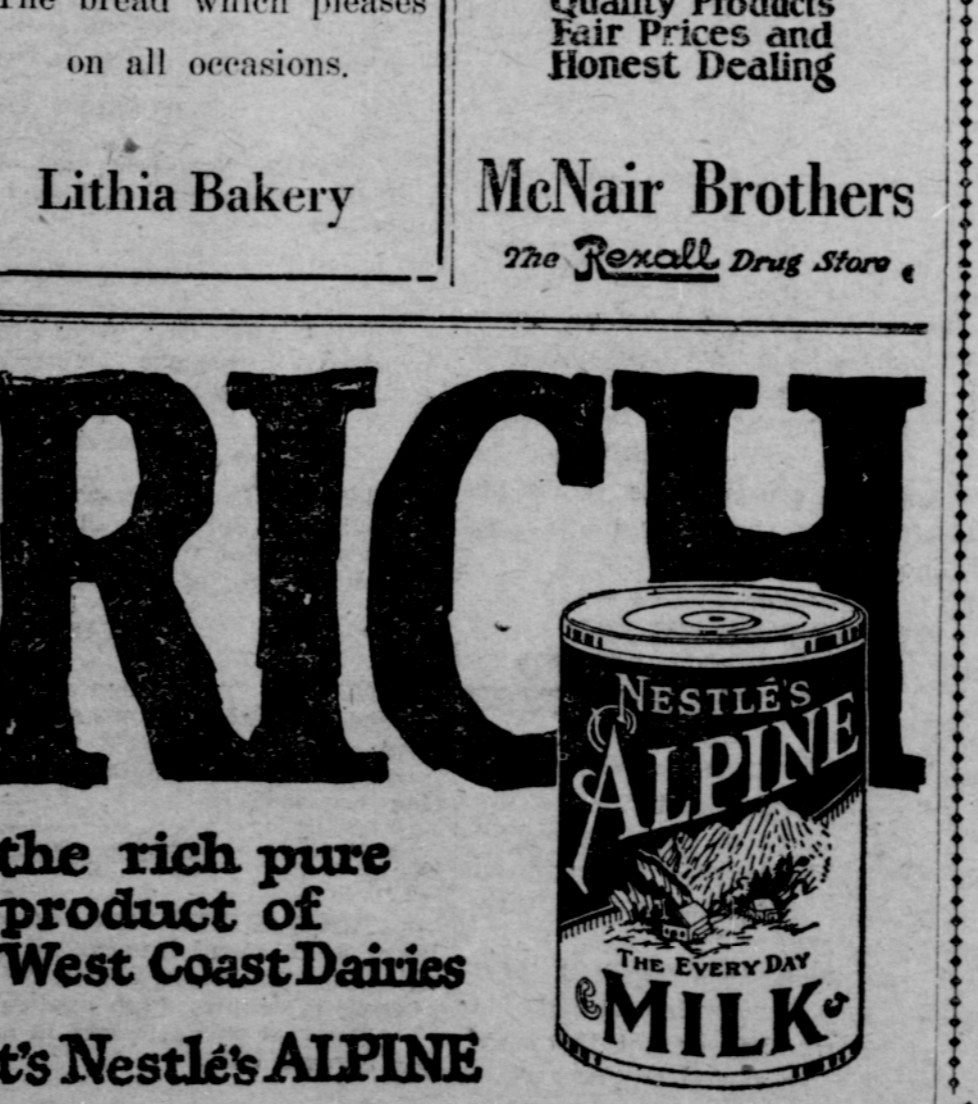

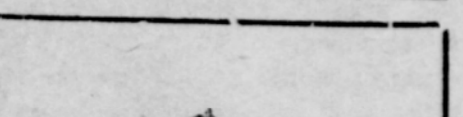
