GIVES DATA ON TALENT PROJECT

At the Kiwanis meeting Monday, O. Arnsperger, engineer for the Talent Irrigation district, gave some very interesting data regarding irrigation in this valley and about the new dam the Talent district is building. He said 45,900 acres under ir-

rigation, or subject to same, divided as follows:
Privately owned.....10,000
Medford district.....10,000
Talent district.....13,100
Roguelands.....6,000
Eagle Point.....6,000
Gold Hill.....800

Total.....45,900
"Adding the 15,000 acres at Grants Pass to the 45,900 acres in this county, makes over 60,000 acres under the ditch or subject to irrigation in the Rogue River valley."

Mr. Anspiger said the new dam of the Talent district, located seven miles from Ashland on the Pacific highway, will get its water from Imigrant creek, will hold 8000 acre feet, and will cost \$320,000.

"The present dam at Hyatt Prairie holds 16,000 acre feet, making a total of 24,000 acre feet for the district, ample to supply their needs. In addition they have 1600 acres served direct by waters of McDonald creek.

"The new dam is known as the thin arch or variable radius, the first one of the kind in the state, and its construction is being carefully studied by the American Society of Engineers, the state engineers and the Copco Co.—Medford Mail Tribune.

GOMPERS IS NOT SATISFIED WITH EITHER PLATFORM

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Privately owned monopoly, as a political issue, is bound to play a part in the present political campaign. This is the statement of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in an article appearing in the American Federationist.

Gompers said the subject compels attention in the political platforms. "The Democratic Party," he continued, "demands strict enforcement of the Sherman Anti-Trust law. The La Follette platform calls for use of the power of Government to crush private monopoly rather than foster it. The Republican platform propounds the good old doctrine of laissez faire, or leave things about as they are."

Parties Miss Point
No political platform meets the thought of labor on the question of monopoly, according to Gompers. He said that the monopoly subject is "well worth special consideration at the outset in order that Labor's future course may be as clear as has been its past record."
