els. Some of the irrigated fields will give very good yields, while a shortage of irrigation water will cause relatively low yields in some irrigated sections. Some few western Oregon farmers have reported spring wheat yields in excess of 20 bushels per acre, but others have had yields too low to pay the harvesting cost. For the state as a whole we have estimated the spring wheat yield at 10 bushels per acre.

make a full crop. Growth of the early and mid-season plantings was checked by dry weather, and the percentage of marketable potatoes will be far below the usual.

Hay-The tame hay crop for the state as a whole is probably about 75 per cent of normal. In some sections there is a full crop of alfalfa, but in others the crop is sufficiently short to bring the average to about 75 per cent of normal. Clover and other tame hay was short as a result of dry weather, there being practically no second growth, and not a full growth of the first cutting. The grain hay yield was very light, but an increased acreage will bring the total production to 75 to 80 per cent of normal. Wild hay will probably not exceed 40 per cent of a normal crop.

Barley-No particular change in barley production indications developed during the month of August. The Oregon crop is now estimated at an average of 22 bushels per acre on 97,000 acres, or a total of 2,134,000 bushels.

Potatoes-The Oregon potato crop showed no material change during the month of August. The late planted crop was probably somewhat helped by the August rainfall but needs more rain to

DATA ON OREGON CROPS PREPARED The fact that numerous western Oregon farmers secured better yields of both spring wheat and spring oats than they had expected prior to threshing does not mean that the spring grain crop was generally good, says F. L. Kent, statistician, United States department of agriculture.

Winter Wheat-There appears to be no reason at this time for a change in the August 1 estimate of winter wheat production. The 1924 Oregon crop has been estimated at 13,365,000 bushels. This compares with the Oregon crop of last year of 24,027,000 bushels.

Spring Wheat-The Oregon spring wheat crop will probably be very close to 2,000,000 bush-
