GRANTS PASS LIBERAL ON EXHIBIT BUILDING

The drive conducted for funds for the erection of the exhibit building in Grants Pass has resulted in the raising of \$11,000 for the structure, \$1000 more than was needed and which will be refunded pro rata among the subscribers, says the Grants Pass Courier. Following the success in being asked for the construction of the building. These bids will be opened next Monday morning at 10 o'clock at the Chamber of Commerce office. The building must be completed within 60 days after the award of the contract. It is planned that the \$10,000 be made to cover the cost of the building and the furnishing of it, so local organizations will not be called upon for that. The main contract will call for the basement and building. Additional contracts will be made for wiring, pumping and heating installation, each being on separate bids.

AGGIE'S COACH GIVES REPORT

PORTLAND, Oct. 2. — Here is the football situation at Corvallis direct from Coach Paul Schissler, new coach of the Oregon Aggies:
"First, we have no punter. That is not fatal, for a punter can

be made, though it takes time. Almost any good man who can kick at all can be made into a good punter if he drills hard enough and long enough. Such a man will not be outstanding but can be made to do. We are working along this line with Tebb, Snider, Liebe and McCart.
"Second, we have no one outstanding, fast, shifty or terrific smashing back. By outstanding I mean a man who is a constant threat to the other team. Such a man makes an ordinary backfield good. I have seen backfield men become stars themselves because they were working alongside a man of this calibre.
"Third, there is no lack of material here, and of good sized men, but we do most woefully lack in speed. An outstanding team must have speed. I'd rather have a team of medium sized fellows who are fast than a team of huskies who are slow and bulky in action. Take Notre Dame for instance. It was speed, not hett that brought fame to Knute Rockne's team last year. My football team requires speed all the time and we won't have much of it this year.
"Fourth, the material we have is raw and green, even the veterans being deficient in the football that I play, but we have been drilling them and they are slowly coming around. The boys here are all willing. Show them what you want and they will give all they have. The boys here will fight. I've seen enough of them to know that."
