MEDICAL CLINIC TO OPEN IN ASHLAND

The Southern Oregon Clinic, who have their headquarters in Medford, have opened a branch office in the First National Bank Building in Ashland, with the idea of carrying on the work here.

The Clinic is composed of Dr. R. W. Stearns, Surgeon and Gynecologist; Dr. R. E. Green, Diagnosis and Internal Medicine; and Dr. R. W. Sleeter, Podiatrist and Obstetrician. Each man is doing general practice even though the group plan is making it possible for the members of the clinic to specialize as stated above.

Dr. Robert W. Stearns who came from Iowa, graduated from the Iowa State University, and from the Northwestern Medical school, since which time he has been practicing in Medford. He has had Post-Graduate work at the Harvard Medical school and with the Mayo Brothers at Rochester, Minn. During the war he served at Camp Lewis and in the U. S. General hospital at Fort Ontario, N. Y.

Dr. Ralph E. Green from Iowa, is a graduate of Rush Medical college. After a year in the St. Mary's Hospital at Milwaukee, he spent 18 months studying in Europe, returning to the Rush Medical college as an instructor of medicine. Before coming to Medford he was consultant and surgeon for 13 years in the Creston Hospital of 78 beds.

Dr. Ralston W. Sleeter is also from Iowa, and graduated from the Iowa State University Medical College. He has practiced in Rockford, Iowa, for 15 years where he conducted his own private hospital. He has attained several post-graduate courses at the Harvard Medical College.

THREE FORESTS HAVE FIRES TO THE SOUTH

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 4.—Forest fires were out of control in three national forests in Superior California today.

In Tahoe National Forest, a new fire which started yesterday between Grantville and the Snowpoint Mine, was blazing with undiminished fury. It was reported at the headquarters in Nevada City today that the fire was apparently of incendiary origin. Several buildings on the old Quinn place, now occupied by the family of J. Lewis, are threatened.

The Central House fire in Tahoe forest was reported under control.

A large quantity of unusually valuable timber is being destroyed by two fires in Plumas National Forest. The fire which for two days has been burning over the Hutchinson Lumber Company property near the Plumas-Butte line, today was reported much improved. The conflagration in the Swayne Lumber Company holdings, however, is still sweeping through virgin timber. It was expected to be under control by night.

Of the fire still burning in Shasta National Forest, the Cold Springs blaze, which has been burning for several days, was practically surrounded today and men were being removed. The Nosony Creek flames, however, were reported advancing rapidly last night. No word had been received from there at the forest headquarters in Quincy today. Six small fires are burning in the forest without doing serious damage.

The fire which late yesterday was threatening the towns of Ingot and Bella Vista, Shasta county, still was burning today but the towns were out of danger.

Three farm houses and a railroad trestle were destroyed in the fire yesterday.

PROSPERITY BEING FELT IN ALL AREAS

WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 4.—The department of agriculture has made public a report from A. B. Genung, agricultural economist of the department, declaring that agriculture is swinging toward par and not in five years has the United States presented so nearly a picture of balanced prosperity as now. The report was made after he had returned from a tour of the leading agricultural sections of the country. "Go into the south this fall and you will be impressed with its prosperity," Mr. Genung said. "Last year went a long way to wipe out the pressing burden of indebtedness. Another cotton crop bringing \$1,500,000,000 cash plus a fairly good season for truck crops, potatoes, rice and small fruits, will put the south into a very comfortable position. General sentiment throughout the region is distinctly optimistic.
