The League of Nations is considered a valuable instrument for peace, but its capacity for action must be strengthened by admitting Germany as an equal member, and by supplementing its activities through the cooperation of the Interparliamentary Union.

Plan 1632, sharing in the first prize, lays down the basis for or-

ganized international co-operation in (1) the complete equality of all nations in the common organization, (2) the abandonment of self-defense—expressed in the cessation of military equipment exceeding that required to guarantee the power of the state within its borders, (3) unconditional subordination of the individual nations to the verdict of the international community and the law recognized and guaranteed by it.

It considers the League of Nations as the most important organization for international cooperation now existing, but that in its present form it is incapable of assuring genuine peace in Europe. It must be transformed in accord with the spirit of the times and adequately to its own purpose.

The plan holds that Germany should continue a treaty policy that would provide for obligatory arbitration in every conceivable case of controversy.

In regard to the Press, the German government should consider measures to convince public opinion abroad of the fact that Germany is at work in accord with the conception of the League of Nations. A thorough-going elucidation of the question of guilt in the World War is of the greatest importance in the moral evaluation of Germany among the nations and the opening of the archives of nations would provide a basis for impartial discussion of the guilt question.

With regard to the Dawes Report, the plan states that it secures for Germany for the first

time the desired evidence of her ability to pay, brings into prospect the enormous reduction of political tension in the Ruhr and Rhine, gives Germany back her economic sovereignty and assures the recovery of Germany as a part of the economic restoration of the world.

In the development of International Law the plan considers the constitution of the League as imperialistic and states that Germany must strive to prevent the political subordination dictated to her at Versailles from gaining the force of law. Germany must take care that in the system of international law which is to come she is the equal of other states.

The plan stands for compulsory arbitration and the abandonment of war as a means of legal defense. It stands for the right of self-determination and protection of national minorities. It states that disarmament is a question of mutual trust, not compulsion, and that general disarmament should be carried out under Article 8 of the Covenant.

In the development of economic intercourse the plan holds that the basis for such intercourse must be provided in international law, that there must be freedom of intercourse and movement, that an international trade law should be created and that all streams serving world commerce be internationalized. The plan concludes with the statement that
