3 FATALITIES REPORTED

SALEM, Oct. 6. — There were three fatalities in Oregon during the week ending October 2, according to a report prepared here today by the state industrial accident commission.

The victims were C. L. Smith, Bend, boom operator; C. M. Pearson, Astoria, rigger; and Thomas Anderson, Toledo, chaser.

Of the total of 648 accidents reported 551 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 96 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the law, and one was from a public utility corporation not entitled to state protection.

OREGON JUNIOR U. S. SENATOR SAYS ROBT. LA FOLLETTE A MENACE

"A vote for La Follette is a vote for hard times," declared Robert N. Stanfield, junior United States senator for Oregon, who arrived in Portland and who will remain in the state for several weeks, off and on, until December.

"The country is now in a prosperous condition," continued the senator, "and there are fewer unemployed at present than in many years past. The working class of people realize this and they want to continue the present program, which is giving employment and causing prosperity. For this reason the American workman is going to think a long time before he supports La Follette for president, especially when he knows that a vote for La Follette is a vote for hard times.

"Should La Follette be elected, which is impossible, and he put into effect government ownership of railroads, as he advocates, it will mean higher and not lower taxes. Government ownership of railroads would mean more bond issues. It would cost about \$20,000,000,000 to buy the railroads of the United States, and to pay for them there would have to be bond issues, which the taxpayers would have to pay, both as to interest and principal. Then, as the railroads would be government property, they would be taken off the tax rolls and taxes would increase to the extent that the railroads now pay taxes. Thus government ownership would hit the taxpayer double: first, to pay the principal and interest on the bonds issued for the roads, and, second, the increase tax the taxpayer would have to meet to make up for the loss of taxes which railroads now contribute to counties and states.

DETAILED MAP OF THREE SISTERS BEING MADE

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 8. — Something of interest to the people of the state and tourists traveling through, is soon to be completed by the department of Geology at the state university. A detailed map of the Three Sisters, mountains in the Cascade range, showing volcanoes, glaciers and other characteristics of that area is being done under the direction of Professor Hodge, of the geology department. He had made an intensive study of this area and later the map and a pamphlet describing the area will be published by the university.

HARTMAN ASKS BIG SUM IN LIABLE SUIT

purpose of circumventing the Blue Sky Law of the State of Oregon, or this could have been known to the defendants by a proper investigation on their part of the records of the corporation commissioner's office of the state of Oregon wherein there appears on file applications of said common law trust to qualify its securities and secure a permit to sell its securities under the Blue Sky Law."

The plaintiff alleges another cause of libel is contained in the following statement: "E. W. Hartman claimed to be the inventor of certain equipment and processes for the extraction of oil from shale and had applied to the United States commissioner of patents for letters patent. These patents were transferred to corporations organized by said Hartman in other states and having millions of paper capital. These companies, it was claimed, were to engage in the manufacture of retorts and other equipment to be used in the extraction of oil from shale which were to be sold at a profit and in addition therefor a royalty was to be exacted from the purchasers. The Hartman Syndicate Incorporated (meaning plaintiff) operating near Ashland, Oregon, bought its equipment from one of these said Hartman Companies," which the plaintiff states was intended to infer that the corporation was in collusion with the patentee of the machinery used, so that the patentee could procure excessive royalties. They state this is untrue and that the patentee furnished the machinery at actual cost F. O. B. place of manufacture.

Another statement of libel, deals with the committee report, alleged to convey the impression "they owned 3000 acres of land near Ashland," "but owned a small acreage in fee, and the greater part of acreage was owned by the United States, and the company had merely made application for a mining lease."

The complaint charges that the company never represented that they owned 3000 acres, but stated in their prospectus, that they owned 320 acres only, and held leases from the government and private property on 3000 acres.

Further cause for libel is alleged to be found in the following from the committee's report. "Those who have in good faith bought stock in this company have a right to a fair share of any profits which may accrue. There is no reason why these stockholders should do all the financing and permit the control of the company and the greater part of the profits to go to those

who have borne little or none of the financial burden. The plaintiff contends that this part of the report was to prejudice the stockholders and that the allegations or inferences are untrue.

This statement from the report is held to be untrue and that it was intended to convey to the stockholders the impression that the company had been mismanaged and that the funds entrusted to the company had been wasted: "It has been charged that the funds of the company have not been carefully expended and that there has been waste and extravagance. It is also charged that properties and equipment have been turned into the company at excessive figures."

The plaintiff states that the funds have not been wasted, that the affairs of the company have not been mismanaged and that machinery has not been purchased at excessive costs.

The plaintiff alleges that as a result of the publication of this report the company is unable to sell stock, is unable to collect on notes which it holds against people for stock sold to them and has been forced to shut down its plant and discontinue its operations to the great damage of the plaintiff and that the plaintiff has suffered special damages as a direct result of the false and untrue statements made by the defendants in the sum of \$50,000.
