CHURCH WORKERS TO COMB COUNTRY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Jesus sent his disciples out two by two to win the world.

Getting back to Jesus' plan, thousands of congregations will send their members two by two into their neighbors to win them to Christ. This movement is part of a great concerted and systematic campaign throughout the country to promote interest in church attendance and church membership. These workers will go into the home of their communities as far as possible, inviting their friends and neighbors to come to church, to enlist as members and to join in its work.

The joint evangelistic campaign which is being launched this Fall by many communions under the leadership of the Commission on Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches, will continue through the Winter and Spring till Easter.

Men and women all over the United States are urged by the Federal Council to train for this effort. They will work under the pastors of their local churches. "Unusual interest is being taken by local congregations throughout the country," said Dr. Charles L. Goodell, secretary of the Commission. "Churches will first make an effort to get all their members out to services on Sunday, and all succeeding Sundays.

"At the same time they will strive to win the interest of those not connected with any church. The object of the campaign is to further the spirit of worship and devotion. The first Sunday in October was observed as Rally Sunday. This date was suggested because it had already been decided upon by several communions.

The movement is a challenge to the pastors to reach their communities. "Christian men and women will visit the entire community. These visitors will welcome back those who have been away during the summer. They will urge those who have become indifferent to the church to return, and will invite those outside into its fellowship. They are to go out two by two as the first seventy disciples were sent by Christ. "The campaign will come to a climax with a great ingathering at Easter."

CALIFORNIA RAIN BRINGS GREAT JOY

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 10.—Farmers of this section are rejoicing today over the rain that yesterday and last night swept over Superior California, bringing relief to drought-stricken fields, pastures and crops.

While some anxiety is expressed among bean and rice men that a continued downpour may do some damage, the general opinion is that the good accomplished by the rain will far outweigh the harm.

More showers fell today and additional rain is in prospect for tomorrow although the weather bureau predicts clearing weather tomorrow evening.

At 8 o'clock this morning the precipitation for the storm in Sacramento was 1.11 inches. Reports received by the weather bureau indicate that the downpour was general throughout Superior California and parts of Nevada. The rainfall was heaviest at Chico, where 2.61 inches were reported. At Red Bluff the precipitation was 1.64 inches, at Oroville 1.65 inches, at San Francisco .58 of an inch, at Fresno .20 of an inch and at Eureka .14 of an inch.

Showers were reported at Stockton and all points in the upper San Joaquin Valley.

A trace of snow fell at Summit. Stockmen of this part of California, who have faced a shortage of pasture for several months are particularly jubilant over the rain. They say it will bring out the grass and provide new green feed for fall grazing.

CRANBERRY CROP TO BE OF HIGH STANDARD

PORTLAND, Oct. 7. — The 1924 Oregon cranberry crop will be marketed entirely through the Pacific Cranberry Exchange, according to R. R. Kipp, manager, marketing department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, who has returned from attendance at a meeting of the board of directors of the exchange at Ilwaco, Wash. Mr. Kipp added that about 93 per cent of the crop on the Washington side will also be marketed through the exchange.

The Oregon crop will be heavy and of splendid quality, according to Mr. Kipp. He said the berries on the Washington side, though of high quality, were running rather less in tonnage than had been predicted earlier in the season, as the pickers were finding as they worked further in the bogs the yield was somewhat light because of the dry growing season; the driest in the record of the weather bureau reports on that district.
