Silver-plated ones are the latest hosiery novelty and are especially smart for evening wear, gleaming through diaphanous silks. To wear with them are charming silver garters, with silver clasps.

Never have stockings offered such a variety of color, for footwear has never been so bright and gay, naturally calling for corresponding tones in stockings.

Pink beige hues, rose-wood, gazelle and flesh-colored shades will probably remain the most popular, according to the leading hosiery designers. A few women prefer nigger-brown and castor, especially with fine kid shoes.

For evening wear the favorite shade is peach, giving a nude effect, and other light shades, worn with satin or lame shoes, are "bananas," "rose-gravel" and "golden-sand." The very newest is called "Impalpable," a cobwebby mixture, which can be pulled through a wedding-ring and weighs only one-fourth as much.

French stocking makers have taken up the sports idea for women and are offering stockings mottled in two colors, the materials being silk and wool, or silk de Chine and whole silk, with silk and linen thread mixed.
