POTHIER ACQUITTED IN MURDER TRIAL
(Continued from Page 1)

The jury might have brought in any one of four verdicts. They are: Guilty of murder in the first degree without the death penalty, guilty of murder in the second degree or not guilty.

Limitations Bar Manslaughter
The jury were prohibited from reaching a verdict of manslaughter and if they determined that Major Cronkrite met his death at the hand of Pothier accidentally they were instructed to acquit, even though they found the defendant guilty of gross carelessness and negligence in the handling of his pistol.

The manslaughter verdict was withheld through the statute of limitations which provides that a person cannot be brought to trial on this charge three years after the crime was committed.

The charge of first degree murder is never outlawed by the passage of time.

The jurors were instructed to study the various confessions of Pothier with the greatest caution. Judge Cushman declaring they should be disregarded entirely if the jurors believe that fear of undue influence was exercised.

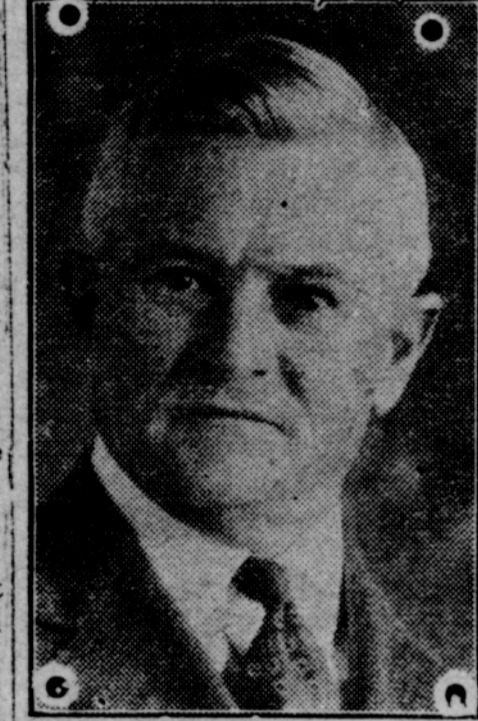

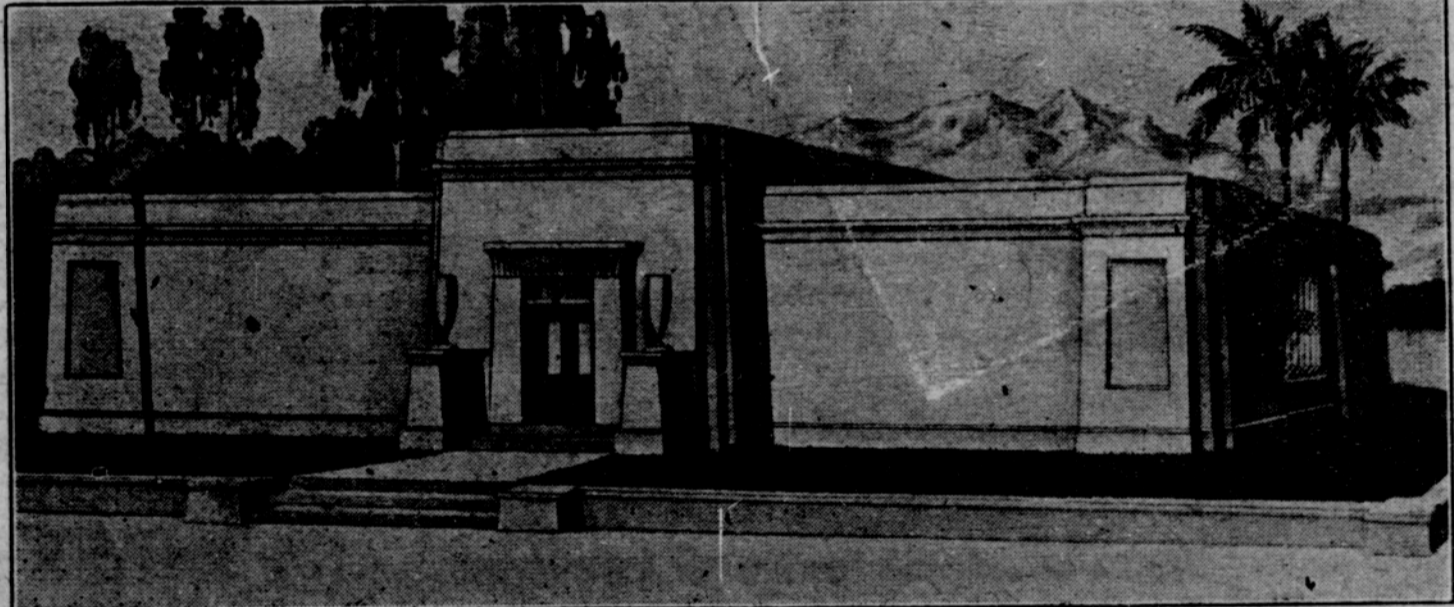

The cost of space in this building was no greater than the average earth burial. The building is now progressing rapidly toward completion and within six weeks a dedication program will be arranged to which all Ashland people will be invited. This memorial is one of the most substantial structures ever built in the United States.

As Lasting as The Pyramids

The Indians at Chiloquin and Klamath are to have a building of the same Egyptian architecture as this one for 1009 sepulchres, caring for the whole Indian reservation. The money has already been authorized for this by the Inter-Council of Indians. Also there is to be a large Grecian architecture building at Medford, which will be constructed in a neocemetry which is under perpetual care. Mr. Mason is superintendent and builder.
