Wardens of five penitentiaries say that 90 per cent of the inmates of their prisons have been drug users.

The sheriff of Los Angeles county, California, says fully 90 per cent of the crime committed in that county has been traced to addicts.

Forty-nine per cent of the prisoners sentenced to Leavenworth penitentiary are sent there for violation of the Harrison narcotics law. Half the time of certain United States district courts is taken up with narcotic cases.

The economic loss to the country annually, due to the use of drugs is estimated by Dr. Charleton Simon of New York at \$1,825,000,000.

The United States, exclusive of the amount smuggled into the country, is by far the largest user of opium among the nations.

The 36 grains of opium consumed annually for each person in the United States is enough to drug every man, woman and child in the entire nation for 30 days out of every year.

BETTER JUDGES NEEDED

The Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court has said that "the administration of criminal law in this country is a disgrace," and that crime "is due largely to the failure of the law and its administration to bring criminals to justice."

The most serious obstacle to the enforcement of the prohibition law is the administration of justice by judges out of sympathy with the law and a majority of the people of the United States.

Courts administered by persons motivated by prejudices of any character imperil the security of the people.

The courts of the District of Columbia particularly should be models for the cities of the nation. This ideal is not hopeless. The vacancy which will exist on the police court bench in the near future should be filled by the appointment of a man who will help to hasten that day. Such men are available.
