#### ARMENIA PREPARE FOR FIGHT AGAINST FAMINE

ERIVAN, Russian Armenia, Oct. 16.—A desperate fight to avert famine next winter is being planned by Armenia and other Caucasian States of South Russia. Throughout the country, relief rationing has been inaugurated and merchants are being arrested for any attempt at usury in grain. Bread supplies will be economized throughout the autumn. Severe droughts are reported by the Near East Relief from all grain-growing districts, but serious shortages are not expected until winter.

#### FAMOUS RECIPES Pilaff

"Hocheput" is a thrifty dish the French in the north make from pork ribs and ears, which are often considered unfit to eat. It is said to have saved the population of Leyde from starvation at the time when the Huguenot Admiral Boisot chased out the Spanish army. Choose a side-rib of about one and one-half pounds. Brown in fat and then put into a large kettle—with the French call it a "marmite"—with the pig's ear at the bottom. Moisten with the fat and season well. Cover this with two pounds of mixed vegetables, cut into small pieces, as for a pot-au-feu, and add a small head of cabbage, cut into quarters. Add two glasses of water, cover and let simmer for three hours.

A kind of hamburger steak comes under the name of "Bitok" in the Russian restaurants in Paris. Have the butcher chop up a pound of rare beef, which is not costly. Moisten one-fifth pound of bread in a little water, press and mix with the meat, together with a whole egg, beaten well. Season. Fashion the mixture into little disks about two inches in diameter and put into a frying pan with fuming fat. Cook for three or four minutes on either side. The inferior should be bleeding and the two sides nicely browned. Pour a little bouillon or white wine into the pan to make a sauce after removing the balls. Serve with potatoes, noodles or spinach.

#### PORTLAND POLICEMAN SUSPENDED 10 DAYS

PORTLAND, Oct. 16.—Police Captain Harry Circle, in command of the day relief at central station, was this morning ordered suspended for 10 days. When his period has expired, he is to be deprived of his command and assigned to other duty, probably at the St. Johns substation, according to the order issued by Mayor Baker.

Chief of Police Jenkins announced that the suspension would begin Thursday, and that Captain Inskeep, now at the St. Johns station would be called in to take command of the first day relief at police headquarters, which post Captain Circle will vacate.

#### TO STOP SMUGGLING ON CANADIAN BORDER

VANCOUVER, B. C. Oct. 16.—The Retail Merchants of Canada plan to make a thorough and permanent drive on smugglers at Canadian-American boundary points, from the Atlantic to the Pacific coasts. A bureau will be organized, with a staff of salaried private detectives, whose duty it will be to co-operate with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Textile and other industrial interests have secured the consent of the Canadian Government to the formation of the bureau, the Government, through Hon. Jacques Bureau, Minister of Customs and

Excise, pledging its fullest co-operation. The fact that all the Western Canadian provinces are now "wet" facilitates the smuggling on an extensive scale, the outgoing cargo comprising chiefly liquor and beer, while silks, narcotic drugs, cigarettes, jewelry and many other commodities come in for sale to manufacturers on so big a scale that some Eastern Canadian manufacturers face ruin by the illicit competition.

In connection with the new scheme, it is proposed to erect iron gates of the Canadian-American boundary intersections. On the British Columbia-Washington State line this would mean the closest possible check being made to stop smuggling at such places as Sumas and Blaine.

It has been stated to the Dominion Government at Ottawa that Canadian manufacturers and subsidiary distributors and traders, as well as retailers, are losing millions of dollars' worth of trade through smugglers taking considerable of the cream off the market.

#### BRITISH POLO PLAYER SAVED BY AMERICANS

LONDON, Oct. 16.—Renewed interest in the Near Eastern refugee situation has been stirred in England by publication of the memoirs of Col. A. Rawlinson, whose post-war experiences in Armenia and Turkey were filled with heroism and hardship. He spent twenty months in Turkish prisons. He has unbending praise for the work of the American Near East Relief, to which he owed his life. Famous before the war as a pioneer motorist, aviator and polo player, he will devote the remainder of his life to humanitarian work.

#### GOVERNMENT FACES COLOSSAL TASK IN WAR FRAUD ACTIONS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—The colossal task of whipping into "court shape" more than 700 war fraud cases in the hands of the war transactions section of the Department of Justice will be pushed to a rapid conclusion, according to the announcement of Attorney-General Stone.

The Attorney-General has recently completed a reorganization of his department, selecting Paul Shipman Andrews, of Syracuse, and Jerome Michael, of New York City, as directors.

Both men are attorneys of national reputation. With a strong force of assistants, they have attacked what is one of the biggest problems of the administration, according to Department of Justice officials.

"In 1922 the colossal task of examining the scores of thousands of war-time contracts on which the Government has paid up, or on which it sold surplus property, proved far beyond the facilities of the Department of Justice," Attorney-General Stone declared.

"Accordingly, the war transactions section was organized for the purpose of investigating and prosecuting war frauds and cases in which the Government had overpaid contractors, or has been underpaid on its sales of property.

Recover Millions "This organization of the department has recovered in two years and paid into the United States Treasury \$6,195,099. It has obtained judgments against contractors for more than \$102-

983 additional. And compromise offers, amounting to more than \$2,500,000, are now in its hands. Thirty-five indictments charging criminal conspiracies to defraud the Government have been obtained. Nine of these have been tried, resulting in three convictions, four acquittals and two disagreements."

In spite of these accomplishments, the Attorney-General pointed out that there are 700 cases remaining before the section for action, referred to it by the War Department and other branches of the Government.

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
