ENFORCE OUR SPEED LAWS

The highway north of Ashland was the scene of what might have been a very serious accident a few days ago, when a light truck was crashed into by a heavy car traveling along the highway at a high rate of speed.

AGAIN OUR LOSS

Within the past three months, the two greatest writers of the present age have been called by the grim reaper. Joseph Conrad and Anatole France, recognized by leading authorities to have been the greatest writers developed during the past fifty years have both been called within the year.

Although classed as the two greatest writers, the works of these men were as different as night from day. France, the romanticist, the conjurer with things mysterious to the ordinary man, achieved his recognition and his greatest fame among the people of the romance states.

Conrad, the virile, the powerful, attained his greatest popularity among the readers of good literature in the English speaking countries. Born in Poland, at an early age a rover, Conrad was recognized as the greatest writer of the English language living, during his last few years on earth.

ROUSING THE NON-VOTERS

Lethargy gives place to awakened interest as the Boy Scouts carry on their campaign to get out the vote in November. The 687,000 active and the 2,000,000 former Boy Scouts are distributing stickers and window cards by the million urging people to vote, and the demand for stickers has become overwhelming, one Boy Scout council calling for three million.

If Maine is an index, the campaign has already had some effect. The vote in that state in September was greater by 45,000, or 25 per cent, than in 1922. But that gain, if general throughout the country, would still leave 26 per cent of the qualified voters unaccounted for, and the Boy Scouts are now getting after them.

Getting out the vote should be valuable not only as a cure for absenteeism but as a cure for one of its chief causes—the blanket ballot. No doubt many people stay away from the polls because they are required to choose among many candidates, of whom they know little or nothing, for many minor offices.

weeks. Inoffensive looking Chinese, each packing his "rod", have been pouring in from Newark, where Chinatown moved almost en masse when vice and gambling were stopped in New York's Chinatown. The police knew the war was coming, but they were powerless to prevent it.

The story goes back twelve years. In 1912 two tong men went to the electric chair in State's Prison at Ossining, N. Y., for murder. Their bodies did not go back to China, as all good dead Chinese do.

Important business men, judges lawyers and assistant district attorneys got the leaders of the On Leong Tong and the Hip Sing Tong together at a great peace banquet, and the hatchet was buried. Arbitration was to settle all future disputes, and firearms were to play no part in the minor disputes that might follow a gambling game or the cooking of a little yen hok.

The banquet was an entire success, and, to prove it, Lee Kay, nephew of Tom Lee, leader of the On Leong Tong, was shot to death in the street directly in front of the banquet hall while the peaceful festivities were in progress. Staid judges stayed not on the order of getting under tables during the fusillade.

But their calmer judgment prevailed, and On Leong Tong didn't take revenge. The electric chair did. And for twelve years Chinatown has been leader than King Tut-ankh-Amen. The peace prevailed even the precincts of the famous old Chatham Club, just around the corner, in Chatham square, where rival white gunmen used to shoot it out about twice a week.

But that's all over now. The end of the truce started about six months ago. Then the police heard rumors that a shortage of \$40,000 had been found in the accounts of the On Leong Tong. It was reported to the District Attorney in true Occidental fashion, and the tong expelled twelve of its members.

UNEMPLOYMENT IS BRITISH PROBLEM

LONDON, Oct. 17. — Unemployment is again increasing in England by leaps and bounds.

Through an increase in unemployment is generally expected during the early autumn months, the increase this year is so rapid that it has occasioned considerable surprise and not a little worry. Political circles, opposed to the government, have made the most of this increase and it has been made the basis of pessimistic predictions on the future of British trade.

During the last ten weeks approximately 150,000 people have been added to the ranks of the unemployed. Nevertheless the statistics of the Ministry of Labor show that the total unemployed are still 137,000 less than at the beginning of the present year.

On January 1, 1924, there were 1,289,000 registered unemployed in Great Britain and Northern Ireland. This figure began to increase during January and steadily declined until it reached 1,052,000 at the end of July. In August the number of the unemployed began to ascend, and by the end of the month it had reached 1,152,000 and still steadily increases.

KLAMATH IRRIGATION BOARD MEMBERS OUT

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 17. — In the face of a letter stating that the California-Oregon Power company would refuse to cooperate in furnishing power and extending lines to farm pumping projects if its candidates were defeated, voters of the Klamath irrigation district Tuesday cast out the present board of directors.

A bitter fight developed just before the election. Bradbury and Jacob were opposed by Hans Nylander, incumbent, and Joseph Micka, both openly in favor of the old regime. Land-owners to the number of 244, holding approximately 50,000 acres of irrigated land in the Merrill-Main district, cast their votes.

The new directors are pledged to investigate the circumstances under which the Keno and Alkeny canals were acquired by the California-Oregon Power company and to determine why water was sold to the power company for 20 cents per acre foot while ranchers were charged \$1 per acre foot.
