Kitchen Adventures Thrill Her



Stage adventure is nothing to the kitchen variety, thinks Edna Starck, a charming exponent of both varieties. Miss Starck who impersonates "Adventure" in the Popular Magazine scene of "Artists and Models" finds an even greater thrill in the culinary adventure of inventing new dishes, for which, it must be said, she has no difficulty in finding an audience as appreciative as in the theatre. Miss Starck is an expert at that rather difficult but delectable edible, Cheese Fondue. Her method is this. 2 tablespoonfuls of flour, 1/2 cup of grated cheese, 1 tablespoonful of crisco, 2 eggs salt, pepper and red pepper, and 1/2 cup of milk. Melt the crisco, add flour, then add the milk gradually. Stir till they boil, cool a little, add the cheese and yolks and seasonings. Fold in the whites stiffly beaten. Pour into a greased souffle tin. Bake 20 minutes in a hot oven. Fold a napkin round and serve hot on toast.

Health Hints by the Father of Physical Culture BERNARR MACFADDEN

To really appreciate the harmful results of drinking intoxicants and the gain in force, physical, nervous, and mental, consequent on temperance or abstinence, one has only to start the day with some kind of stimulant, and continue to indulge hour after hour. The next day let him use no stimulant at all, and he will be decidedly depressed, his mind will not be so keen, nor his head so clear. The nervous system that is not accustomed to the use of excitants will never know the restlessness and worry and feeling of exhaustion which eternally beset the man who tries by the daily use of stimulants to keep his nerve-cells from becoming naturally exhausted.

Those who are used to tea and coffee and other stimulants, and as a consequence suffer from digestive disturbances, congested liver, nervousness, and numerous other ills, will do well to change to cocoa, which is not only a pleasing drink, but is a nutritive one as well. The hot water used in making cocoa is stimulating and gives the user a grateful sense of comfort. It is an aid to digestion and causes no debility.

Since water forms a large proportion of all our tissues and is being lost constantly in the excretions, it follows that a considerable quantity (estimated at from three to five pints) must be taken daily in some form or other. A glass of cold water on rising rinses out the stomach and keeps the appetite for breakfast. Generous draughts of cold water between meals flush the intestinal tract and relieve a tendency to constipation. Hot water, taken just before going to bed, relieves headache caused by indigestion, and is excellent in cases of insomnia. Many persons have to exercise extreme care in their use of milk, which may curdle in a mass in the stomach, or may cause constipation, the former may generally be obviated by taking the liquid slowly, and a sip at a time; the latter by modifying the milk by the addition of water to suit the individual. It would be well for us to look to our drinking if we would live a natural and normal life. To enjoy superb health and all that health means, the drinking of tea or coffee and alcohol should be religiously avoided. If, however, you will persist in drinking tea or coffee, why not do it very moderately?

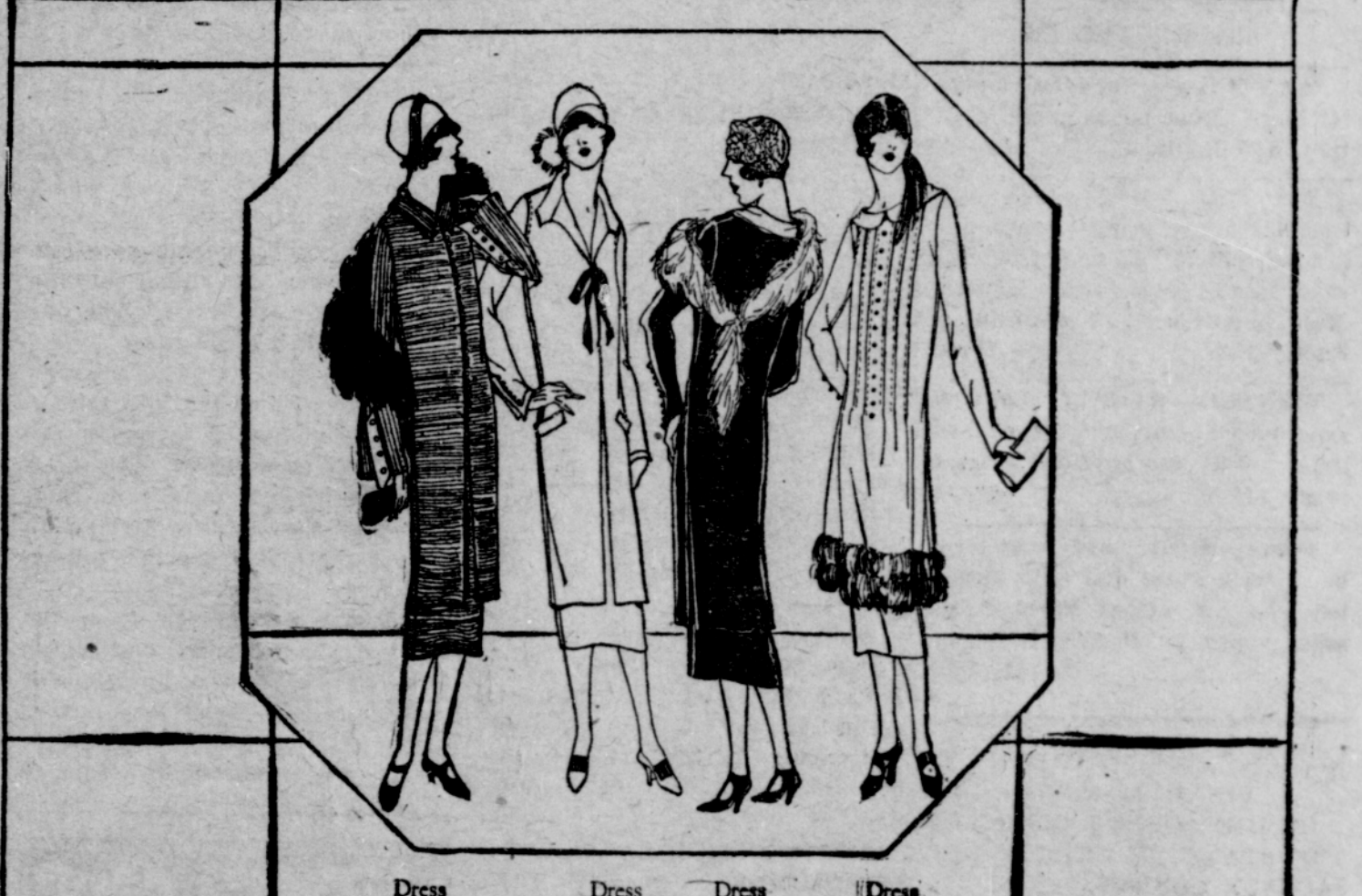
Yank Out the Stumps (National Crop Improvement Service.) IN THE cut-over land where the clearing of stumps is a regular business, the operator will be able to pull most of the stumps with a good wire cable in a very simple mechanism. Stumps pull easiest after a soaking rain. Now and then it is necessary to use dynamite or some other explosive, but if you are troubled with stumps, get the stump literature from your agricultural college or from your local dealer in wire cables and other equipment. The stump not only occupies valuable space, but it takes time to plow and harvest around it.
