MINING OFFICIALS VISIT IN ASHLAND

Ashland: I wish to make herewith a brief statement, which has been delayed for some time on account of private business cares. As a candidate for the mayor, I am in favor of progress; an improved water system, a clean city in every sense, continually moving forward; clean streets; green lawns and favorable publicity, and as much of this as we can afford. I am in favor of a sufficient bond issue for the construction of a water system, not only for present needs, but for a greater population and greater need. After a long, slow, hard pull, Ashland is near the summit where we can get a better view of the future. I think we should all have faith in our city and work to the end that we may increase our population, for in this is our hope of reducing taxation. We surely have, this season had some unfavorable publicity

throughout our tourist travel and this should not occur again, if it is possible to prevent an occurrence. A reasonable bond issue for an adequate water supply by the most practical and economical method, and a judicious, careful expenditure of the money voted will, I think, solve the problem. While we have many problems before us to solve during the next few years, the relief of our present condition as to an adequate water supply is our greatest problem — which must be solved. If elected, I will do my best in all matters that may arise.

There is nothing sentimental in being elected mayor or councilman. They are positions of trust and service and mean a sacrifice on the part of every one accepting such positions. If elected, I will endeavor to perform all my duties in accord with the requirements of law and my understanding of the situation or the matter in hand, whatever it may be, in a careful business-like way.
