He said he had voted the Republican ticket continuously since the first time he stepped up to the polls, and added that he intended to continue voting the Republican ticket as long as he was able to go to the polls. Mr. Hall will autograph the Lincoln book next Tuesday, which will be presented by the caravan to President Coolidge.

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The observations at Emigrant Creek dam by the research committee appointed by the Engineering Foundation, will deal with characteristics of the concrete, concrete temperatures at various depths from the surface, deflections under changes of temperature and of water loading and local stresses at selected portions of the dam. The series of measurements will probably extend over more than one year, and the results may prove beneficial in influencing the engineering profession to recommend the arched radius dam instead of the types which have been used.
