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PLENTY OF COAL ON HAND TO MEET A HARD WINTER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4. — If a hard winter comes it will find the American people "sitting pretty" with relation to their coal supply. Dr. George Otis Smith, Director of the United States Geological Survey, declared recently.

The contributing factors in bringing about this situation are, first, the menace of labor troubles in the mines has been removed through the agreements signed by both the anthracite and bituminous producers and miners, insuring an uninterrupted supply of coal, and second, the increasing number of people who store coal during the summer season.

The Government's inventory of coal stocks showed that the total quantity of soft coal in the hands of commercial consumers on September 1 was about 47,000,000 tons.

Retail dealers' stocks of anthracite were 71 per cent larger on September 1, 1924, than they were on the corresponding date of 1923. The production of anthracite during the first eight months of this year was steady, and during the summer months the output flowed into the storage piles of producers, retailers and consumers.

There are no available statistics on householders' stocks, but production figures and retail dealers' deliveries indicate that householders' stocks are normal.

Over the country as a whole industrial concerns had a fifty-six day's supply of bituminous coal on September 1. The reserves vary with the distance from the mine and the character of the coal used. The figures indicate that New England, Wisconsin and the upper Peninsula of Michigan and the northern Rocky Mountain region had a ninety days' supply, and that New York, New Jersey and the Carolinas had better than a sixty-day supply.

The railroads have a supply of coal to last them forty-four days, while electric light companies have supplies to last them fifty-eight days, and manufacturing gas plants had a ninety-day reserve.

Production of bituminous coal is averaging around 40,000,000 tons per month, while the output of anthracite is slightly beyond 7,000,000 tons.

One of the outstanding characteristics of the miser is his slovenly, ill-kempt appearance. One of the predominating characteristics of the spendthrift is his tendency toward flashy clothes.

In this day and age of the world, no man, especially the young man with his hopes and dreams of great success, can afford to neglect his personal appearance. Clothes do not make the man, but a good appearance is part of one's equipment for the battle of life.

Any movement now in progress which has for its object merely making people spend more money for clothes is economically unsound, but any educational movement which seeks legitimately to encourage sensible practices in these matters is worthy of praise.
