WHY TRAFFIC SIGNS ARE YELLOW

A strong, bright yellow is superior to all other colors un visibility and luminosity, say two scientists who make a business of knowing all about colors. The brightness of yellow is the chief reason for its use in marking directions, warnings, and safety zones for the control of traffic. So it is that parking, car stop and other traffic signs are painted in yellow, usually with black lettering.

"Yellow is the symbol of light and wisdom, and hapby is he who follows wisdom's ways in running his autonobile," says M. Luckiesh, director of the Laboratory of Applied Science, National Lamp Works of the General Electric Company. Further approval comes from Henry furner Baily, dean of the Cleveland School or Arts, who believes of yellows: "From the standpoint of color alone they are not the most striking, but from the standpoint of color plus brightness, the yellow is the best color that can be selected."

Now, isn't all that erudite and informative? And everywhere nature sets up her bright stop signals: "Stop! Please your palate!" says the plain little dandetion; and "Stop! Hold your nose!" says the gorgeous chrysanthemum. But aren't the savants a bit belated with their good words? Yellow has long needed a friend. ADVERTISING PSYCHOLOGY

Columbia University is prepared to teach psychology for the advertiser. The course in the psychology of advertising, so the University announces, deals with human behavior as it may be excited and controlled through advertising. The devices and methods of advertising will be illustrated and analyzed to determine their value in arousing interest and in establishing belief.

Psychological laws will be applied to make advertisements readily understood and remembered, the announcement explains, and provision is also made for study of the motives susceptible to appeal through advertising. They must slowly climb it round Advertisers are continually seeking more effective methods of getting and holding consumer demand. The mind of the reader is a sort of no-man's domain to the advertiser. "No, I don't like that," says the reader, and goodwill or a sale dies a-borning.

But why does the reader say "No?" Why isn't he in agreement with the message of the copy? That is the riddle. It may be that Columbia can give the answer. If so, advertisers will be nearer to complete conquest of yes-man's land-where every prospect is pleased and only "no" is vile.—The Nation's Business.
