### OLD RALLYING CRY IS HEARD IN IDAHO

LEWISTON, Ida., Nov. 12.—The old rallying cry, "a free river from Lewiston to the sea," must be renewed, said Joseph Teal, President of the Umatilla Rapids Association at the annual meeting here today. "Until the great agencies progress, and the Snake and Columbia rivers are put to use, the inland empire and the Pacific Coast section can never reach the full measure of their development and growth." Teal added. Citizens of all parts of the Northwest gathered at Lewiston to discuss the first great unit proposed federal power development, the Umatilla Rapids of Columbia.

### WEALTHY VANCOUVER MAN IS ARRESTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12.—F. Anderson, wealthy Vancouver, B. C. attorney, was arrested by Deputy U. S. Marshall today on a charge of violating the prohibition laws. He was released under \$5,000 bail. The arrest of Anderson it is said will herald the start of a government drive against the Pacific coast rum running ring that controls the Quadra and other ships in the liquor trade between the Dominion of Canada and the California coast. Secret warrants are out for two other men, one being Russell Whitelaw, Vancouver millionaire, the federal officials admitted.

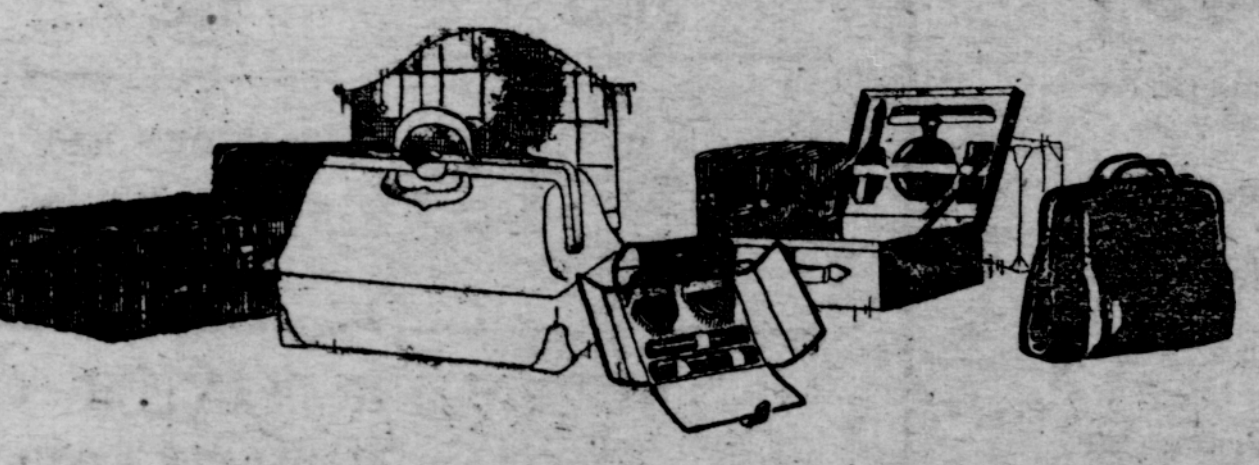
