FIRE ACCOMPANIES BLAST AT JERSEY

JERSEY CITY, Nov. 14—Fire which started with a terrific explosion in the salt petre works of the Battelle and Renwick company, in the downtown industrial section early this morning, razed almost an entire block of the leading industrial works in this city today.

Following the explosion, the fire spread to factories and dwellings on adjoining streets, and continued to rage unchecked throughout the morning. Fourteen persons most of them firemen, were taken to hospitals suffering from smoke poisoning, from the smoke which came off the burning chemical plant.

A general alarm, turned in immediately after the fire broke out, brought out all the city's fire fighting equipment, and every ambulance in the city.

COMMITTEE REPORTS ARE HEARD AT MEET OF ASHLAND KIWANIS

No Program Given, Lyceum Courses Are Explained to Body by Chairman

Since no program had been arranged for the Kiwanis Club luncheon held today at the Hotel Ashland, the meeting was given over to the reports of committees and a discussion of several matters of interest to the members of the club.

A report was heard from the committee, working in conjunction with several other committees from various organizations in the city, in promoting the lyceum courses to be given here. It was explained that the course arranged for Ashland this year is the best offered by the Ellison-White company, and since it was of such high class, will require a lot of boosting in order to make it a financial success. It was explained that although the courses are being brought here under a percentage agreement, that it would be necessary to raise at least \$200 to pay for the staging of the four numbers.

The members of the membership committee were instructed by President Henry Enders, to meet and consider the names of several prospective members.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL PLANS ARE DELAYED

SALEM, Nov. 14—Governor Pierce and State Treasurer Myers majority members of the state board of control, at a meeting held here Monday voted to defer indefinitely the advertising for bids for the construction of the new state training school for boys.

It was said that the governor and state treasurer based their action on the contention that the state would be short of funds because of the income tax law at the recent election.

The records show, however, that the money with which to build the training school was appropriated by the last legislature, and that a part of the fund already has been expended in the purchase of a site.
