WORLD WAR MADE U. S. COAST DEFENSE OBSOLETE, REPORT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.— As a result of the World War, practically all the seacoast fortifications and other defense of the United States and its possessions became obsolete, due to developments in the range and power of artillery mounted on capital ships and it is part of the work of the Engineer Corps to work out and build new defenses, according to the annual report of Major-General Harry Taylor, Chief of Engineers, to the Secretary of War, made public today. ... The World War, General Taylor's report asserted, showed that not only were these defenses underpowered in major armament, but defense against aircraft was either lacking or totally inadequate. The only anti-aircraft searchlights available were those purchased during the war, which were limited in number and in many cases unsuitable. ... Practically all available railroad artillery will be of value in strengthening our coast defenses, General Taylor reports, but the 14-inch, 50-calibre 1920 model gun is the only one which may be classed as major seacoast armament, and it is available only in limited numbers.

ACCIDENT WAS DEATH CAUSE FINDS JURY

(Continued from page 1) finding the whiskey and gin in the automobile, 96 bottles of whiskey and bottles of gin, which was turned over to Coronor Perl. Mr. Jones, proprietor of the Log Cabin garage near the accident, stated Page had said he had been driving and that both of them had gone to sleep when the accident occurred. Said as far as he knew neither of the men in the car were drinking or drunk. He testified he did not know what became of Leer and that the last he saw of him, Leer was running toward an automobile which was headed south. He did not see him enter the car. Leer told him he must get to a telephone or telegraph station and that he seemed greatly excited and frightened. ... The official verdict of the jury was; that Arthur Edward Page came to his death in an automobile accident near the Log Cabin garage, located north of Siskiyou Summit, in Jackson county, Oregon, Wednesday morning November 12, 1924, about 7 o'clock, when he apparently went to sleep while driving an automobile occupied by himself and Jack Leer, and that death was apparently accidental.

LIGHTNING RODS CUT FIRE RISKS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.— Lightning rods reduce the danger of fires in electrical storms 95 per cent, according to the United States Bureau of Standards. ... Most of the fire damage from "rodded houses" results from faulty installation, it was declared. ... "The chief usefulness of the lightning rod is to receive and dispose of lightning strokes, and not to prevent strokes by gradual drainage of thunderstorm electricity, as is sometimes assumed," bureau officials said. ... "It has been shown that the amount of electricity thus removed from the air by gradual drainage is too small to be of practical consequence, and that rodded buildings are little less likely to be struck than buildings not rodded. ... "In designing lightning rod installations, therefore, it is considered necessary to assume that direct strokes will occur, and to provide rods that will dispose of such strokes without damage to the building or danger to its occupants."

Board of Engineer Equipment at Fort Humphreys, Va., which is charged with the development of engineer equipment has developed light, medium and heavy types of pontoon equipment; portable steel highway bridges; pile drivers and bathing units; mobile water purification units, gasoline pumping sets and shop truck units, and has made extensive tests in burlap substitutes and with tractors. ... In the development of personnel, General Taylor reports that, in addition to the usual training of officers and men, the establishment of engineer units of the Reserve Officers' Training Camp has been very successful.
