These ostrich flounces will probably be seen as long as dancing is so popular, for nothing is prettier on a dancing frock than these soft, feathery sprays.

Cock feathers are being used for boas to replace the ostrich boas of last season. Molyneux is trimming a black cape with wine-rop cock feathers, which are very effective.
