WELL KNOWN WOMAN DIES IN BERKELEY

Mrs. Josephine Applegate McCallen, who died at her home in Oakland Sunday morning from an attack of heart failure was the widow of the late A. McCallen, founder of the First National Bank of Ashland.

Following Mr. McCallen's retirement from active management of the bank the family moved to Berkeley, which city has been their home for a number of years. Mrs. McCallen was a native daughter of Oregon, daughter of James Applegate and granddaughter of Charles Applegate of the Applegate brothers who led the first extensive immigration to Oregon via the covered wagon route.

She is survived by the following children: Mrs. Gertrude Mullt, Long Beach, Calif.; Mrs. W. L. Curtis, Ashland; Andrew J. McCallen, Ashland; Mrs. Edna Hill, Healdsburg, California; Edward McCallen, Berkeley, California; all of whom are at Berkeley to attend the funeral which will be held at the family home tomorrow, Wednesday afternoon at 2:30.

Mrs. McCallen is also survived by her aged mother, Mrs. Caroline Applegate, who is past 90 years of age. She resides at Monrovia, California. Two sisters, Mrs. Lulu Godbell of Monrovia, California and Mrs. Herbert Oakley of Los Angeles survive her.

TERRIFIC GALE IS CAUSE OF DEATHS

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—With seventeen deaths in the wake of an ice-peppered gale, warmer weather was predicted for today and tomorrow. DEPARTMENT CAN DECIDE ON AREAS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The Department of the Interior has the authority to decide finally the area of irrigation projects under the Carey Act, based on the needs of the land, and available water, the United States supreme court held in deciding the cases of the Commonwealth Trust Company of Pittsburgh against Smith and others of Twin Falls, and the Salmon River Land and Water Company against Caldwell and others, and the Idaho Irrigation Company against Fred Gooding and others.

DANUBE RIVER IS SCENE OF PIRACY

GALATZ, Rumania, Nov. 18.—Operating up and down the Danube river in a powerful motor boat armed with a machine gun, Terenti, the notorious pirate, is still at large despite the united efforts of both Rumanian and Hungarian police to catch him. One of his late adventures was to fight his way through a company of Rumanian soldiers near Bralla. Terenti makes a specialty of captives for ransom, and he prefers to gather in women and children of well-to-do families. He shows consideration to the poor fishermen and farmers along the river, who warn him of the activities of the police. He recently found two girls who had been bathing in the river near Galatz and whisked them away in his speedy boat before they could make an outcry.

EMILIE DAESCHNER TO BE NEW FRENCH ENVOY TO AMERICA

PARIS, Nov. 17.—When M. Jules Jusserand, French Ambassador to the United States and dean of the diplomatic corps in Washington, retires before the end of the year after nearly 30 years of service in America, he will be succeeded by M. Emilie Daeschner, one of the few French diplomats financially able to accept the post.

Mme. Daeschner, his wife, inherited an immense fortune from her family, the Krugs, world-famous champagne manufacturers. They will be accompanied to America by their daughters, Mlle. Antoinette, 20, and Mlle. Irene, 18. Another daughter is married in France, and their only son is in the Schneider steel works at Creusot.

The Daeschner family came to Paris from Alsace one hundred years ago, and the New Ambassador was born here in 1863, and has spent much of his diplomatic life in the Foreign Office because of his great administrative ability.
