River Rises—The Rogue last night took a sudden upward trend and this morning had reached a flood stage of 12 feet or just about the same as that of the previous rise. With 1.10 inches of rain falling during the past 24 hours aided by a warm wind which took the snow off the lower hills, the Rogue's rise was rapid. It started to recede this morning, however, after reaching the seven-foot stage at the crest of the Savage Rapids dam. When this amount of water is pouring over the dam a much greater rise is experienced in those portions of the river where the current is now so swift.—Grants Pass Courier.

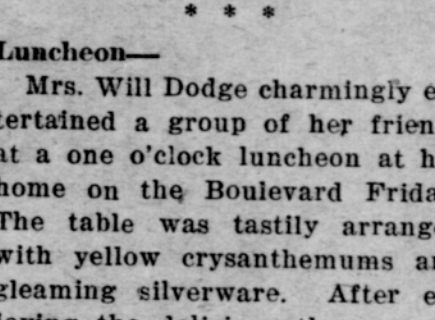
Postponed—The chicken pie dinner which was to be given tonight at the Parish house has been postponed.
