 SALEM, Nov. 28. — Protesting the necessity, but realizing it was the only means of saving the credit of the state, the emergency board today authorized a deficiency appropriation of \$18,516.89 to meet payments and interest due Monday on state irrigation district bonds. The failure of the Ochoco, Warm Springs, Slide and Summer Lake irrigation districts to meet this obligation, due to their inability to collect taxes, has thrown the burden on the state, the board stated.

FRENCH NEGOTIATE FOR DEBT PAYMENT
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. — After a lapse of more than two years, the French government has actually begun preliminary negotiations looking toward adjustment of her war debt to the United States, it was officially learned here today.
 The French debt is in excess of four billion dollars. None of the accumulated interest has been paid. Jules Jusserand, returning ambassador has already had one conference with Secretary of the Treasurer Mellon on the matter and another is likely.
