THE RESPONSIBILITY OF PARENTS IN BRINGING UP OF YOUTH

Altho in an unguarded moment, it is claimed, Solomon did the rash act of taking unto himself some forty wives to cherish and maintain, he uttered words of wisdom, touching the training and bringing up of the youth of the land. When he contended that the sparing the rod was spoiling the child and that an eye should always be turned upon the youth of both sexes, with the view of seeing that there was no neglect in treading the straight and narrow path for the betterment of the individual and mankind in general. The Parent-Teacher Association is achieving encouraging results for the youth of Ashland and have reached the declarative point that the parents as well as the boys and girls of our community need a gentle overhauling, if all is to go well with us.

Parental neglect is existent in the most woeful manner in too many homes in Ashland and until this is realized and made conspicuous by its absence, the A. P. T. A. is shown of half its useful purposes.

An influential Portland newspaper has this much to say about the chronic indifference on the part of the child towards the parent and the parent toward the child, and justifies punishment as a last resort, when all other means fail.

The Portland Editor thus expresses himself:—"When a mother continually tells her child if he does this or that again she will whip him soundly, and yet never uses the rod, the child soon despises the mother's threats, and all her good neighbors hold her method of discipline in contempt. This is about the sort of an alma Mater America is."

Multum in Parvo, faithfully describes this editorial utterance which is as true and honest as anything in this world can be. Whatever our short comings may be as a nation let not the neglect of the American home be one of them.

Demonstration House Wins Honorable Mention In Campaign For Better Homes In America



When the Better Homes in America movement was inaugurated three years ago, some five hundred communities scattered throughout the country competed for the awards. The next year about double that number took part, and many communities had two or three demonstration homes entered. Hamilton, Ohio, had two, one of which is shown above. This house received honorable mention in 1923 from the judging board. Donn Barber, shown above, is a noted New York architect and fellow of the American Institute of Architects. He is also a member of the Board of Directors Better Homes in America. Dr. John M. Gries, whose picture is shown in the foreground, is in charge of the

notable researches in the field of housing, being chief of the Division of Building and Housing of the Department of Commerce. Dr. Gries is also treasurer of Better Homes in America.

The aim of Better Homes in America is to increase the number and the quality of American homes. While one of its major aims is the encouragement of thrift for home owning, the scope of its activities extends, in an educational way, to every phase of home making.

The movement is entirely non-commercial in character, being supported entirely by public gifts, which have already been largely assured. The movement was entirely reorganized early this year. Harvard University granted a special leave of absence to Dr. James Ford, of its faculty, in order that

he might take active charge of Better Homes in America. Headquarters, formerly in New York, are now in Washington, at 1653 Pennsylvania Avenue.

The movement culminates each year in "Better Homes Week", for which the period from May 11 to 13 has been designated this year. There is every reason to believe that the effort to aid American families to get everything possible out of the home, from the standpoint of economy, comfort and beauty, will reach many hundreds of new communities this year. Special stress is being laid upon the home for families of small or moderate means, and a special effort is being made to extend the movement to the rural sections of the country as well as the cities, towns and villages.
