IRRIGATED LANDS AND FARMERS

The state emergency board has just voted \$18,516.39 to meet state obligations on interest guarantees for irrigation district bond issues.

Initial cost to the farmers for land and water on many of the eastern Oregon irrigation projects is so high that they cannot possibly hope to make farming profitable under the capital outlay.

POACHING PLANES IN MISSOURI CATCH GAME BIRDS IN NETS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 5.—State Game and Fish Commissioner Frank H. Wielandy is mobilizing his forces to combat a new menace, which, unless checked, threatens to wipe out, in a single season, Missouri's migratory game birds.

Aerial netting is the new danger that is facing wild fowls as they cross Missouri on their flights south.

Mysterious airplanes, with long nets attached to the lower wings, have been reported scooping wild geese and ducks literally out of the clouds by the dozens. The nets are baglike in shape, with two-inch meshes, and few birds out of a flock escape when the pilot swoops down.

Commissioner Wielandy immediately armed a number of his deputies with high-powered rifles and ordered them to shoot down the airplanes engaged in aerial netting of wild ducks or geese.

Since news of his drastic action has spread over the State, the Commissioner has been swamped with telegrams, telephone calls and letters from anxious aviators of their relatives asking whether he was sincere in his expressed purpose to fire at airplanes found violating the game laws.

ing near a river or lake," was the purport of the messages. "Stay away from rivers and lakes," Wielandy shot back. "It isn't necessary for aviators to follow the courses of rivers."

Commissioner Wielandy explained, however, that he had also equipped his deputies with collapsible telescopes, which they can use to spy on planes and to wigwag warnings to the pilots if necessary.

"Each deputy will have a small red flag, which he can fasten to the end of his telescope and wigwag to pilots who appear under suspicious circumstances," Wielandy said. "If the pilot ignores the warning, my men have instructions to shoot. And they will shoot!"

Mr. Wielandy said he had affidavits from three well-known St. Louis business men who had seen the airplanes in action against flocks of wild fowls. He said he knew of the operations of three airplanes in the State. One has been netting birds at the mouth of the Missouri River, another a little farther down the river, and the third in the middle of the State.
