**HAWAIIAN JAPS DEMAND RIGHT TO TRAVEL IN U S**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. — A determined fight is to be made by Japanese and other Orientals born in Hawaii for the right to pass, without interference, to the mainland of the United States, it was revealed today in the annual report of Governor Farrington, made to the Secretary of the interior.  
American citizens of Oriental ancestry are now subjected to what appears to citizens of Hawaii as discrimination, the report declared.  
These Oriental citizens, whose number is steadily increasing, will lay their claims before the President, it is understood, in the near future, in an effort to secure privileges of free traveling into all parts of continental United States.  
The report declared that general health and industrial conditions have been very satisfactory throughout the year, with the two largest industries, sugar and pineapple, producing the largest crops on record, which have been sold at fair prices.  
Total trade between the Territory and the mainland of the United States amounted to \$178,816,499. Hawaii sold products to the mainland valued at \$109,000,000, and bought from the mainland centers products valued at \$69,000,000. Hawaii's trade with foreign countries
