**AUTO LICENSES IN
OREGON SHOW GREAT
GAIN DURING YEAR**

SALEM, Dec. 8. — For the
eleven months of 1924, conclud-
ing with November 30, the state
of Oregon issued 191,450 licenses
for passengers and commercial
power propelled vehicles, accord-
ing to a report just made by
Secretary of State, Sam Kozer.
Licenses were also issued to 2,756
motorcycles, 600 dealers, 14,566
chauffeurs and 47,156 operators.
The total revenue to the state was
\$4,753,915, a gain of \$684,305
over the receipts for the entire
year of 1923. Before the year is
over it is expected that a total
of 193,000 licenses will have
been issued.

Although the tourist season is
now at its lowest point, the re-
cord of registration of foreign
cars shows the issuing of visitors'
permits under the Oregon law
to 2,232 during November. This
brings the total number up to
74,143 for the year. California
leads, with Washington second in
number of cars registered during
November as well as for the en-
tire year. The state of Wash-
ington registered 720 for Novem-
ber and 17,119 for the year. From
January 1 to November 30, the
greatest number of registration
were made at the Ashland sta-
tion, with a total of 18,052 for
that period, and 444 for Novem-
ber. The Portland station leads
for November, with 488 permits.

**WORLD COURT IS TO
COME UP AGAIN SOON**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. —
The proposal of American en-
trance into the World Court will
be brought before the Senate at
the first opportunity. Senator
Borah of Idaho, chairman of the
Senate Foreign Relations Com-
mittee announced today.

Borah renewed his declaration
for the World Court, divorced
entirely from the League of Na-
tions, but said Congress owed it
to the people of America to pass
appropriation bills and to take
up agricultural legislation be-
fore taking up the world court
issue.

**VOTE IS EXPECTED
ON MUSCLE SHOALS**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—A vote
on a plan to dispose of the gov-
ernment's Muscle Shoals power
and nitrate project at Muscle
Shoals, Alabama, is expected
either tomorrow or Wednesday,
following a conference today be-
tween Secretary of War Weeks
and Senator Underwood of Ala-
bama. Although Weeks holds the
Underwood plan—providing gov-
ernment operation of the project
if the plans are not sold before
July, 1925—as unworkable with-
out amendments, Underwood in-
dicated today that he would ac-
cept any changes submitted by
the administration.
