his parents when but a child had grown to manhood there. He received his education in the Shan-non schools. He was a likeable chap and a great favorite among the young people of the community. His ability to make and keep friends and be a friend to them in time of need was an outstanding characteristic throughout his life. When he attained his majority he turned his face toward the west and engaged in farming in Brown county, Kansas. In 1886 in that county he was married to Mary A. Byer, who survives him. Two children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Stoner in Brown county, Pearl B. Stoner, who later became Mrs. Bert Spaulding, and Raymond C. Stoner, at present a resident of San Diego, Calif. After moving with his family to Glendale, Ariz., in which move he was accompanied by a large number of relatives and friends, Mr. Stoner again engaged in farming. Mr. Stoner opened the first mercantile store in Glendale and was that city's first postmaster. Glendale is now a flourishing city. Although he was busily engaged in his livelihood, Mr. Stoner found time to engage in religious work, seeking seldom-frequented places where he preached and sang. In Glendale two children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Stoner, Ezra B. Stoner, who died four years later, and Leah M. Stoner, who is now Mrs. Clarence Barney of Los Angeles, Calif. After living in Arizona six years, Mr. Stoner sold out his interests and moved with his family to Ashland, Oregon, where another daughter was born, Ila Ruth Stoner, now Mrs. E. M. Hussong of Santa Ana, Calif. In Ashland, Mr. Stoner established a furniture business and later established his claim to a homestead. He acquired an apple orchard on which was grown some of the finest fruit in the famous Rogue River valley. Mr. Stoner was successful in all his enterprises and put into practice in his everyday life the principles which he endeavored to persuade other to embrace. With the assistance of Mrs. Stoner, a Holiness mission was established in Ashland and from this humble beginning the present Ashland Nazarine church came into being. For years Mr. Stoner was superintendent of the Sams Valley Sunday school in which work his family was also faithfully engaged. It was in Ashland that his health suffered a serious reverse and with Mrs. Stoner he moved to Southern California. In Los Angeles he became a devout member of Angelus Temple, Almee Semple McPherson, pastor-evangelist, and gave within his means to further the work of The Church of the Four Square Gospel. Mr. Stoner was especially interested in the installation of the Temple of a radio broadcasting station and it was later from this same station he was able

to enjoy the services and the preaching of Mrs. McPherson. Although his health did not permit him to go about greatly, Mr. Stoner was instrumental in placing in the hands of a large number of people in out-of-the-way places the tracts of his church. He often visited the Midnight Mission in Los Angeles and did what he could to further that work. Realizing that soon he was to be called home, Mr. Stoner in his last years enjoyed many hours in sweet communion with his Redeemer and was never fearful of the eternal sleep which soon was to come to his body. Even in his delirium he besought the blessing of the Master and prayed that he might soon "meet him in the skies." His final message to his family and friends was that they might embrace in its entirety the Word of God without rejecting any part. He was firmly of the opinion "The signs shall follow who believe." He expressed the hope that his family and friends might be faithful unto the Lord and pray much. Funeral services were conducted from the Winbigler funeral

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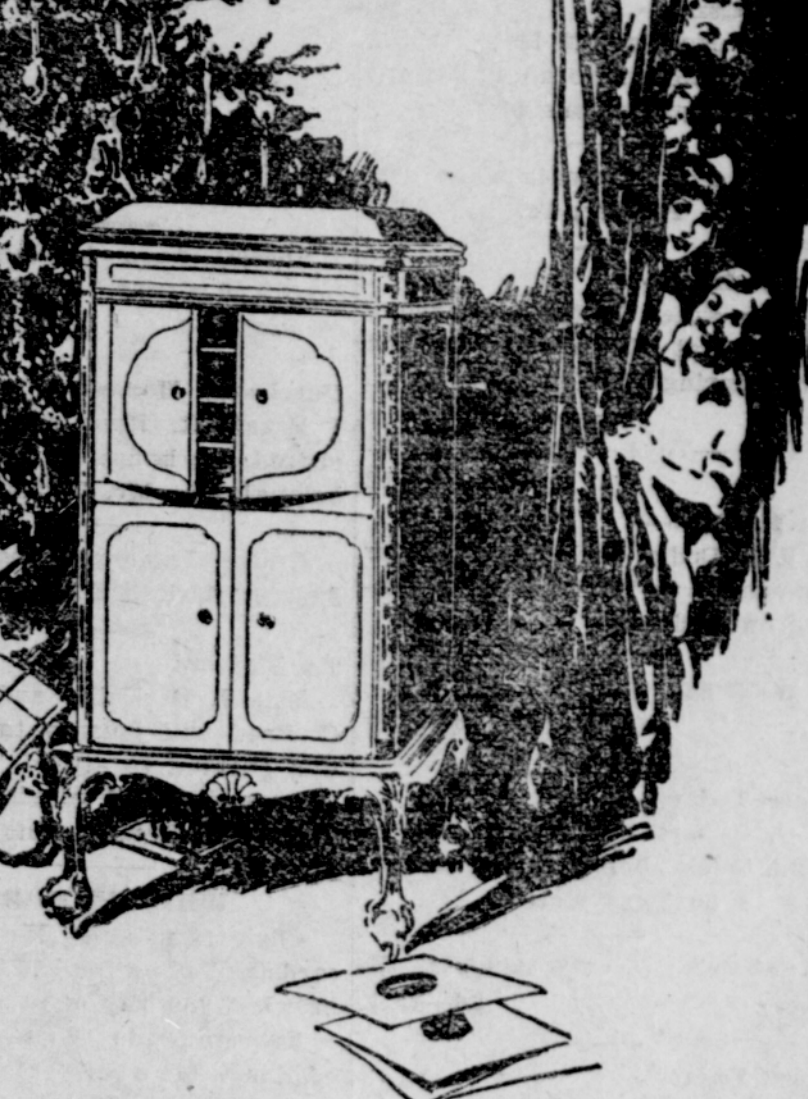

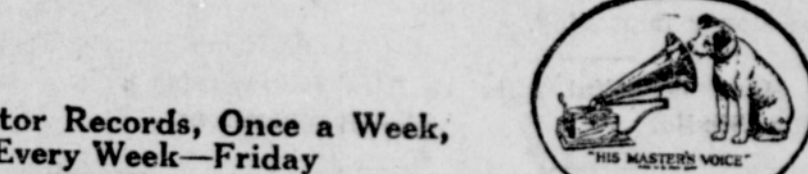
