Japan Fighting SHIP STOWAWAYS

TOKYO, Dec. 9. — Japanese shipowners have petitioned the Government to pass more stringent laws to protect them against "stowaways."

The shipowners declare that so many Japanese are attempting to hide aboard their ships, hoping to be able to smuggle themselves ashore when the ships reach an American port, that it is hurting their business.

Under the United States immigration laws, foreign ships are required to post heavy bonds as guarantees that they will not bring passengers into the country illegally; and when stowaways are found on board penalties are inflicted.

The Japan Shipowners' Association has filed a petition with the Government asking that the emigrant protection law be revised, so that sterner penalties would be imposed upon those who board a ship illegally. They believe this will act as a deterrent to smuggling, which, they allege, is being instigated by agents, who collect huge sums from Japanese under promise of gaining for them admission to the United States.

Dr. Jameson, dean of women at the Oregon Agricultural College, spoke before the girls of Ashland High School, Wednesday afternoon, December 10.

KING GEORGE WANTS TO SAVE MONEY BY GIVING UP STABLE

LONDON, Dec. 11. — Only the earnest persuasion of the Prince of Wales, Princess Mary and Lord Lascelles prevented King George from selling his racing stable at the end of the racing season on November 22. King George had fully determined that he could stand the expense of the stable no longer. Since he became King it has cost him, on an average, one hundred to one hundred and fifty thousand dollars yearly. He says frankly that he cannot afford it. Added to this, King George does not like racing. He is not interested in horses. Queen Mary would not let him bet even if he wished, and he and the Queen would much prefer to spend an afternoon at the movies rather than make one of their State entrances at Newmarket.

Only for one reason has he kept on his string of horses. It is because the late King Edward, that great turf enthusiast, requested on his deathbed that they should not be given up. But con-

racing animals, the best is only third rate. The only way by which the King could hope to make any money out of the establishment would be to go into the open market and buy expensive blooded stock, after the manner of the Aga Khan, or the new school of French owners, like M. Blanc.

On the other hand, the Prince of Wales and his sister have argued that it would be a great popular disappointment if the place were closed down. As they pointed out, the British racing public always likes to see the royal colors carried in the big events, and the King's withdrawal would be regarded as a direct blow to the horse-breeding industry in Britain.

The King was impressed by these arguments and also by a suggestion of the Prince that the stable should go in for breeding good hunters, for which there is always an excellent market. In the end it was arranged that the stable should go on its present form for another year, the Prince and Lord Lascelles to give it their personal supervision, and that next year the whole question of its existence should be taken up again.
