Connecticut Seeking to Save Shore Line

HARDFORD, Conn., Dec. 17.—Hoping to keep pace with the neighboring New York State, directors of the Connecticut State Park and Forest Commission are asking the State to furnish \$5,000,000, of which \$3,000,000 is to be used for parks and \$2,000,000 for forests. This is expected to give results proportionate with New York State's proposed \$15,000,000 State Park and Forest fund, and to aid the State in saving some of its shore lands from the hands of wealthy residents, who are fast closing the shores of Long Island Sound to the public, as well as to aid in preserving the State's trees.

Edward R. Pusey, a well-known coal dealer of this city, and former Mayor William G. Taylor arrived here, after an exciting experience during a squall on the river near Newcastle. They had been to Georgetown, Md., where Mr. Pusey had left his thirty-foot power boat to bring the vessel to this city to put it up for the winter. They came through the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal, and after reaching the river they en-

countered rough weather, and during the squall the rudder was carried away. They were in danger of being swamped, but Mr. Pusey managed to steer the craft by using the two engines.

School Savings Banks Show Large Increases

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—An increase from \$11,807,000 to \$20,435,000 in school savings

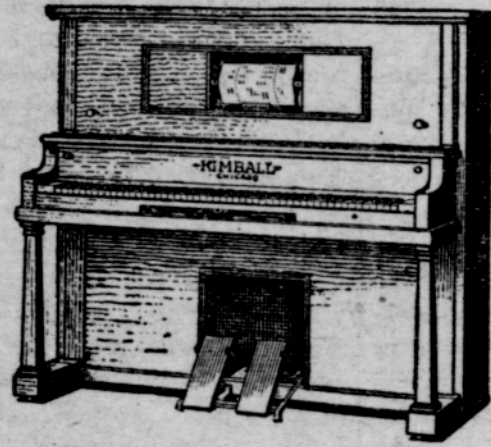
the year closing June 30, 1924, according to a report issued by the Savings Bank Division of the American Bankers' Association. The report states that the collections increased from \$10,632,000 to \$14,991,500 in the same period, while the number of pupils participating in school savings grew from 1,907,851 to 2,236,326. The number of reported school savings systems grew from 494 to 683 and the number of schools from 6,868 to 8,080.

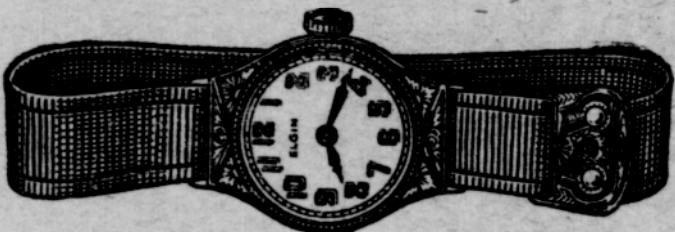

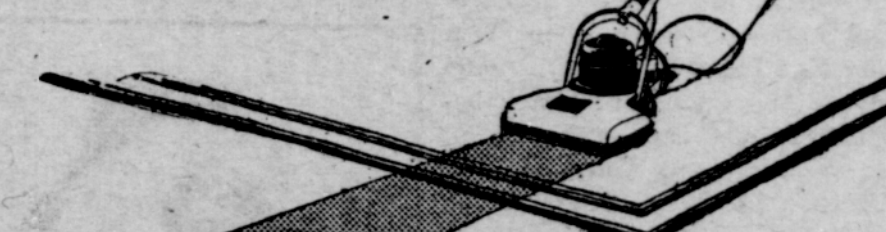
