The girls were accompanied by Miss Helen Cowgill, assistant state club leader, and Miss Helen Dustin of Portland. On the way East they were joined by delegates from Washington and Idaho.

Both girls praise their trip highly but are perfectly satisfied with Oregon as a permanent residence.

The first games for the coming season are scheduled for January 2, and 3 with Newburg, followed by games with University High of Eugene, January 9 and 10. The first league game is set for January 20 at Roseburg.


