The third in the trio reviewing Calve's story of her life was Mrs. G. A. Briscoe, who told of the singer's further travels in many lands; China, Japan, India, Australia and Egypt being visited. Mrs. Briscoe also told of her more recent visit to the U. S.; her work during the World War and the routine of her life in her home—a castle in France. Calve was glad that America was visited during the best years of her career.

A number of beautiful records were played in illustration of her lovely voice, emphasizing its wonderful range.

All of the speakers were especially well prepared and the membership feel that much credit is due those who bring these messages to the Club. It was a matter of regret that Mrs. Woodside found it impossible to be present to lend her voice in the illustrative feature of the program.
