OBITUARY

W. S. Howard died at his place of residence last Friday night, December nineteenth, 1924, at eleven o'clock, after months of ill health, and the funeral services were held last Monday afternoon at Stocks Undertaking Parlors. His health began failing a year ago, but he made no complaint, pursuing the even tenor of his way in his characteristic quiet and pleasant manner.

Apoplexy was the cause of his death. The body was buried at the Mountain View Cemetery, Ashland, Oregon. The grave was covered with flowers which nutely told of the esteem, in which he was held.

W. S. Howard, was born at Smiths Mills, Chautauqua County, New York State, April 7, 1850. He was married to Miss Lizzie Gibson, daughter of David and Hannah Gibson, pioneers of Northern, at Plymouth, Indiana, April fifteenth, 1880. The same day of their marriage they went to Paola, Kansas, where Mr. Howard was engaged in the practice of his profession for seven years. Here their two children were born, Mrs. D. A. Highberger, of Pueblo, Colorado, and David G. Howard of Ashland, Ore. In 1890 the Howard family moved to Pueblo, Colorado, where they resided for nineteen years. Mr. Howard being the representative photographer there for that time. In 1909 Mr. and Mrs. Howard and son David moved to Ashland, Ore., where they have since resided on a ranch 3 miles east of Ashland, Ore. Mr. Howard was a member of the Elks Lodge of Pueblo, Colorado, and he also was a Knight Templar.

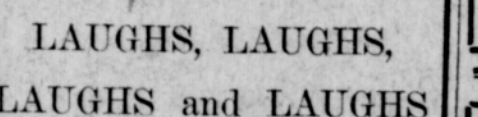
