### 4 KILLED IN SHOTGUN MASSACRE IN INDIANA

LOGANSPORT, Indiana, Dec. 29. — A shotgun massacre, with four members of a Sengle families as victims was uncovered here today when neighbors broke into the Bassler farm house, ten miles north of here. The victims were Henry Bassler, 69, Viola, his three year old grand daughter, Mrs. Catherine Bassler, his wife and John Bassler, his son. Mrs. Emma Hoabon, the mother of the murdered child is missing.

### GEN. MCCOOK'S GRAVE DESECRATED, CHARGE

STUBENVILLE, O., Dec. 29. — Complaint that the burial place of General Daniel McCook, one of the famous "Fighting McCooks" of this city, is about to fall into the hands of Georgia tax collectors and that the place is being desecrated, is made in a letter sent to United States Senator Frank B. Willis, Ohio, by Colonel William L. Curry of the Army of the Cumberland, relatives of McCook here have been advised. Colonel Curry requested that the War Department take charge of this property.

baseball fame, received his name. At the time of his death, General McCook was commanding a brigade of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois soldiers. After the Civil War, surviving members of the brigade purchased sixty-seven acres of land on which the battle was fought and erected a monument in memory of the general. It is charged that residents in the region of the Georgia battlefield have been cutting timber on it and disposing of the lumber. The alleged vandalism included removal of lumber from a building on the site. Some years ago, it was pointed out, Congress authorized transfer of the property to the custody of the Federal Government.

### GEOLOGIST SCOFFS IDEA CONTINENTS WERE OCEAN BEDS

CHICAGO, Dec. 29. — The continents Atlantis and Gondwanaland, which scientists have said spanned the space now covered by the waters of the Atlantic, connecting the Western Hemisphere with Africa hundreds of thousands of years ago, are little more than geological fantasies, according to Prof. R. T. Chamberlin, University of Chicago geologist. "And, what is more," declares

Prof. Chamberlin, "the present continents were never ocean beds, as has long been supposed. "Our continental areas have been continental areas several million years," the Chicago geologist contends. He states there have been changes, but such changes have been slight. The Atlantic Ocean, he cites, for example, was but little farther eastward three million years ago than it is today.

Prof. Chamberlin, however finds that the numerous discontinuities in the records of rock strata show that these submerged areas have been transient and shifting. "It is generally agreed," he says, "that the nature of deposits of sediment on the continents indicates that they have been deposited in shallow seas on the continents, and that the present continents have never been depressed to form parts of the deep-

sea floor." Prof. Chamberlin bases his conclusion independently of theories heretofore advanced. He states he has found that existing mountain ranges are, with few exceptions, parallel to the borders of present continents. He also says he has discovered that the trends of mountain ranges millions of years ago were parallel to the then existing ranges. He assumes from these observations that the ancient continents occupied much the same position as present-day ones do. "The water must go some place," he concludes, "and there
