As Fritz Kreisler, world famous violinist, was about to begin a concert in Vienna, he received a letter, signed by men who said they would be an "accidental" shooting unless \$700 were forthcoming. No arrests were made. Rupert Hughes, novelist and motion picture writer, whose first wife committed suicide in Indo-China a year ago, is soon to be married to Patterson Dial, a motion picture actress of Los Angeles. In attacking the Underwood bill to lease Muscle Shoals to a private corporation, U. S. Senator George W. Norris declared the lease "would make Teapot Dome look like a pin head." A London paper declares the famous \$500,000 gem collection of Lady Ludlow, stolen from Bath House, her London residence, has been returned. The paper makes the amazing declaration that the jewels were stolen by thieves who acted for a Chicago millionaire, whose heart ached for the collection, but that he died before the thieves could turn them over to him.

ENGLAND WILL SEEK LA CROSSE TITLE
SYRACUSE, N. Y., Dec. 30.—England may invade the United States next Spring to win back the international la crosse championship taken by Syracuse in 1923.

The coming of an All-England team composed of Oxford, Cambridge and Stockport stick-wielders, was forecast recently by Head Coach Laurie D. Cox, of the Orange la crosse team.

At the meeting of the United States Intercollegiate La Crosse Association it was urged that international contests take place at least every two years. This would mean that 1925 must be the next period for the American-British engagements.

It was first thought that Oxford and Cambridge might combine as an Oxford team. This, however, seemed inadvisable, for neither twelve is too strong. Stockport, however, holds the North England championship and is regarded in English la crosse circles as Syracuse is in the United States.

Should this visit of the Englishmen be arranged by Coach Cox, it is entirely probable that Syracuse will have just as strong a team to meet the invaders as that of last year, which again won the national title.

Not many of last year's regulars were listed. Under the direction of Coach Harvey J. MacAloney and Captain W. P. Townsend, the freshmen of last year have been drilled systematically and have developed into players of real calibre. The coaches have been aided by varsity veterans from time to time.

In the coming of the Englishmen cannot be achieved, Syracuse will take steps to effect another trans-Atlantic voyage for the Orange twelve, Coach Cox said.

\$60,000,000 DEPOT FOR CHICAGO LIKE ANCIENT TEMPLE
CHICAGO, Dec. 30. — A new epoch in railway terminal development will mark the opening of the sixty-million-dollar Chicago Union Station on or about February 15.

Spreading out over a larger and larger area, the gray-limestone terminal has continued to grow until, in its massive style of architecture, it resembles an imposing temple of antiquity. From atop the bridges spanning the Chicago River it stands out like a new city.

When the completed terminal swings open under auspicious ceremonies, the ancient terminal building will be quickly demolished. The whole transformation including all work on the new terminal, will have been carried out without interference with a single train. This is just one phase of the unusual engineering skill.

BIGGEST OFFICER, 692 POUNDS, DEAD IN HIS TEXAS HOME

FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 30.—Sam (Big Boy) Harris, the "world's biggest constable," is dead.

But there survive many reminiscences that will remain legends in his home town of Farmersville, Texas.

Fifty-two years old and weighing almost 700 pounds—692 to be exact — Sam was borne to his grave on a motor truck, encased in the largest coffin ever constructed. It aggregated, with his remains, a combined weight of 1,518 pounds. The great casket could have accommodated four men of normal stature.

Sam was memorable for his boast that "he was as strong as he was large." His favorite declaration was that he could "lift anything loose on both ends."

In his career as city marshal his great size and strength often proved a source of economy to the city. These assets precluded the necessity of purchasing a patrol. It was recalled that on one occasion he carried three muchly inebriated men a distance of over a mile to the city bastle.

Then again his office duties included the task of aiding the village fire department. When the State bank burned Sam, single handed, pushed the huge one-ton safe from the building, but it took two horses to return it to the new temporary offices the next day.

He never slept in a bed. Nobody ever made one that would rest his huge frame. He reclined on the floor. Sam had a pleasure car too. It was a ton truck with the old family couch securely fastened to the floor of the body.

With a canopy over his head the big constable made his trips to surrounding communities reposing on the couch while his deputies coaxed the truck into action.

His meals were the feature at traction of the town. Sam could, and did, consume more food at one "sitting" than any other six men in Farmersville. In the pre-Volstead era he complained local spirit emporiums never kept enough cold beer on hand to fill him up.

His recent visit to New York as a delegate to the woodmen of the World convention proved a sensation. The emblematic ax that he carried could not have been lifted by the average man.

Perhaps the most thorough idea of his enormous size can be gained from the measurements he once supplied a mail order house for a suit. Weight 692 pounds, height 6 feet two inches, waist 78 inches, chest 70 inches, hips 84 inches, thigh 52 inches, calf 30 inches, collar 24 inches.

The mail order tailors were convinced Sam had overestimated his figure and made him a suit, although big enough for two average men, was yet too small for the constable. He sent it back with the note that he had ordered a "man's size suit and when he wanted one for his youngest boy he would specify as much."

He was survived by eight children, four boys whose combined weight totaled 720 pounds, four girls aggregating 686 pounds, and his wife, who tipped the scales at 190.

CLEVER MAGAZINE ISSUED BY MADHOUSE INMATES
LONDON, Dec. 30. — A magazine written and edited by lunatics, has been started in England. Some cynics may say that there is nothing new in this, judging from some of the exhibits on the newstands, but these lunatics are actually in an asylum and are not merely literary bugs. They are inmates of the City Mental Hospital at Humberstone, Leicester. The patients' magazine, which contains both prose and poetry,

is never edited or censored by saner outsiders. A recent number of the magazine contained some verses on the buttercup and a sociological study captioned "Should Married Women Work?"

TREASURE OF LODGE IS EIGHTY-EIGHT YEARS OLD
WATERTOWN, N. Y., Dec. 30.—Watertown Lodge No. 49, F. and A. M., boasts of the distinction of having the oldest lodge treasurer in point of service in the State, if not in the country.

John S. Coon, who is eighty-eight years old, was elected treasurer of the lodge in 1875 and re-elected every year. He expects to be re-elected this year to serve his fiftieth term in that office.
