LOS ANGELES, Jan. 2.—"The football season is over," declared Coach Rockne today in refuting reports that a game is being arranged between Notre Dame and the University of California, to be held on January 10. "Notre Dame came to the Pacific Coast for one game only and I am taking the boys back to their studies and we'll meet no other western eleven," Rockne said.

G. N. Anderson, son of the late E. K. and Mrs. Anderson, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Phillips on E. Main street Thursday, Jan. 1, at 5:50 o'clock. He was born at Talent on the Anderson donation land claim where he spent his early childhood, attending the public school at that place. Later entering the Ashland Academy.

He followed farming for a number of years, enjoying the outdoor life. In 1895 G. N. and his father bought the Ashland Woolen Mills which they successfully operated, until it was destroyed by fire in 1900. Where again he turned his attention to his former pursuits of farming and fruit raising. On November 25, 1902, he was married at Eugene, Oregon, to Miss Emma Coleman, a successful school and music teacher, who passed away several years ago.

George, as he was familiarly known was of a retiring, kind, christian, character, clean in word, thought and act, generous to a fault-thinking of others before himself. He has not been in robust health for some time, yet never a word of complaint passed his lips. His fraternal relations are A. F. A. M., I. O. O. F. and Woodmen of the World.

G. N. Anderson is survived by four sisters, L. V. Edwards, L. A. Phillips, A. Belle Anderson, D. E. Wight, who mourn his departure.

PORTLAND MAY GET VETERAN HOSPITAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—After a long discussion of the hospital situation with General Hines, chief of the veterans bureau, Senator McNary today announced that he feels assured that Portland will be recommended as the site for a general hospital before the house committee. Hines expressed the belief that Portland is the proper site for the hospital.
