bullets began to fly everyone got to the wall as soon as they could except Henry Bagby. I believe at least ten shots were fired and one of them struck the man who is dead.
Bagby states that he first thought the whole thing was a

hoax and believed he recognized one of the men.
"I began joshing them and one jumped over this railing you see by the table and grabbed me by the arm. Shoving me toward the wall he made it quite plain that they meant business. The larger of the two bandits gruffly announced that 'anyone turning his head would have it shot off' and when the fellow next to me started to sink to the floor I realized it was no joke."
