Call of America Brings Girl Back

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The call of America, her birthplace, has brought Miss Teresipa Di Primio back to this country alone from Italy, leaving her parents in that country. They had taken her to Italy when she was a baby; but she returned to America as soon as she was old enough.

No immigration official could challenge her right to admission. Miss Di Primio had her birth certificate. There was no danger that she would become a public charge, for she is over the children's age limit of sixteen. So she went on her way to join her cousin, Mrs. Luisa Di Mico, in Syracuse. She explained her return by saying:

"When I grew old enough to realize what it meant to be born in America I determined to claim my birthright even though it meant separation from my parents, who are excluded by your technicalities. There are other thousands of American-born children in Italy who will come back to their native land when they are old enough to travel alone."
