## ROSEBURG WOMAN HURT IN SMASHUP

ROSEBURG, Jan. 6. — Miss Lucile Sharpe of Roseburg was painfully injured Sunday afternoon when the automobile in which she was riding was wrecked by a southbound Portland-Roseburg auto stage near the Rise Creek schoolhouse. The girl was a passenger in an automobile driven by Tom Findley of Roseburg. An automobile was parked on the highway on a curve and as Findley approached from behind it the stage was coming from the north.

The driver of the light car tried to stop behind the parked automobile; his automobile skidded on the wet pavement into the car standing on the edge of the road and was thrown crosswise with the pavement in front of the auto bus, which went into the ditch in a vain effort to avoid the collision. Although the stage was somewhat damaged by the impact none of the passengers were hurt, and the bus came to Roseburg under its own power.

## STATE FAIR BOARD TO GATHER JAN. 12

SALEM, Jan. 6. — Members of the Oregon state fair board will meet in Salem January 12, when plans will be outlined for the 1925 state fair. At this meeting a representative will be selected to appear before the legislature and recommend an appropriation for improvements to the grounds and buildings. Although not yet outlined by the board, it was reported that a number of substantial improvements are contemplated. One of these is the erection of a modern building to accommodate the boys' and girls' industrial clubs. It is also proposed to build a number of new sidewalks on the grounds and paint and otherwise improve the present buildings.

## ADAMS RESIGNS AS CAPTAIN IN O. N. G.

Brigadier-General White and Major Joseph V. Schurr visited the local Battery B at their regular drill last evening, and presented faithful service medals. Capt. James Quincy Adams won a fifteen year medal and Donald M. Spencer a ten year medal. Five year medals were presented to Clyde G. Election of officers will be held at the regular drill at the Armory next Monday night.

## MANY APPLY FOR JOB AS ATTORNEY GEN.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. — A score of names are today before President Coolidge, from which he is to select the successor of Attorney General Stone who was elevated to the Supreme Court bench. Charles Warren of Detroit, former ambassador to Japan and Mexico, and a nationally prominent lawyer is believed to be the leading figure. Others mentioned are Solicitor General Beck, Chief Justice Rugg of the Massachusetts Supreme Court, Frank Dietrich, District Judge of Idaho, whom Senator Borah urged for the post last year, and Secretary of the Navy Wilbur.

## GOMPERS' WILL IS TO BE CONTESTED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. — A contest over the will of the late Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor was today filed by his widow, Mrs. Gertrude Gompers, 41, who married the labor leader three years before his death. The estate is valued at \$20,000. Mrs. Gompers alleges that the second will, executed a few weeks before her husband's death, and by which she was cut off without her dower rights, was due to "fraud, and undue influence" exercised by Samuel J. Gompers, her step son.

## GERMANY PROTESTS ALLIED OCCUPATION

BERLIN, Jan. 6. — Germany sent a note to the Allied powers today, protesting the failure of the Allies to withdraw their troops from the Cologne district. Germany emphatically denies the Allies' charges that Germany had not lived up to the Versailles treaty, and had continued to manufacture war materials and permitted the storage of arms and munitions, far above the condition permitted by the treaty were taking place. The German press is almost united in protesting against the allied note, calling it "a policy of brutal force," and "a cheap pretext."

The question of the city council purchasing the building and lots when they are offered at public auction has been brought before the council; but, it is understood, the city council, asked one question which some reader of the Tidings may be able to solve for them. "What would we do with the building?" was the question asked by the councilmen. This is a sensible question for the city to ask; for it would be unwise for them to buy the property unless it can be used advantageously. The Tidings feels that if the city or other agency does purchase the property, the plan should include the improvement of the lot and entrance between the Camps and Pioneer buildings, so that it would form an attractive invitation for tourists to inspect the Chautauqua building. The property can be purchased at a very nominal sum. What do you suggest the building could be used for and what agency could best handle the proposition?
