LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8.—Was

Mrs. Evelyn Ford Darling, of  
Los Angeles, says there was, and  
claims to be the grandniece, eight  
times removed of the well-known  
verse maker.

"Mother Goose was born Eliza-  
beth Foster, and by tracing back  
my family I have found she was  
my great aunt, eight times re-  
moved," declares Mrs. Darling.  
"She was born in 1665 and in  
1693 she married Isaac Ver  
Goose, member of a Holland  
Dutch family.  
She was a member of the Old  
South Church in Boston, and died  
in 1759.  
"Mother Hubbard was a real  
woman and Little Boy Blue was  
a son of Mrs. Ver Goose."  
Mrs. Darling is the daughter  
of the late James Edward Ford,  
of Norfolk, Va., and has made  
her home in Los Angeles since  
1902.

## Nurse Gives Pint of Her Blood for Transfusion

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. — Al-  
though Miss Mabel Scrippen,  
twenty-six, a hospital nurse, of  
Yonkers, heroically gave a pint  
of her blood by transfusion to  
save the life of her brother Ed-  
ward thirty-five, an ex-service  
man, he died of blood poisoning in  
Hudson City Hospital.

Scrippen's death was attribut-  
ed to infection resulting from the  
extraction of a tooth by a den-  
tist.  
His sister, who was employed  
in the hospital, offered to give  
a quart of her blood in two oper-  
ations to save him, but he died  
before the second transfusion  
could be made.

eight or ten men could raise  
funds sufficient to pay off the  
interest until the city can take it.  
There is no way to get the  
title from the Southern Oregon  
Chautauqua Association except  
through foreclosure and sale as  
the stock holders of the corpora-  
tion are scattered throughout  
the United States and many are  
dead. Transfers would have to  
be made through the heirs and  
legal representatives."

Chamber of Commerce — "A few  
years ago the City of Ashland  
bought from the Chautauqua As-  
sociation land lying across Ash-  
land Creek from the creamery,  
the amount paid for this purchase  
was re-invested by the Chautau-  
qua Association in the new Chau-  
tauqua building as it now stands.  
So the City of Ashland, or the  
Ashland community, at present  
has an investment of \$15,000 in  
the Chautauqua building, not to  
consider the beautiful grounds  
upon which the building now  
stands, and by which it is sur-  
rounded, as well as the approach  
to the grounds from Main Street,  
up to the band stand and the  
cement block building and its  
ground.

Can the City of Ashland allow  
this possibility as an addition to  
her present wonderful park sys-  
tem to go into private hands for  
the small amount of the mortgage  
now pending foreclosure?  
In private hands all these ap-  
proaches to the grounds, and the  
most accessible frontage can be  
sold for handsome sums as build-  
ing frontage, or otherwise bar-  
tered away, and the city will lose  
the opportunity to own and man-  
age the most remarkable build-  
ing and largest auditorium in  
Southern Oregon, if not in the  
state.  
One might go into many other  
features of the Chautauqua build-  
ing and grounds such as correct-

acoustic properties, warming the  
building and repairing it, sub-  
dividing so that smaller audiences  
could be comfortable and warm,  
and again the whole building  
might be used for large assem-  
bles, and also uses the city could  
make of the building from the  
standpoint of profit, and as a  
great community asset and bene-  
fit, all of which can be worked  
out. Lets have a small bond is-  
sue, make the purchase and add  
these grounds to our park, place  
both the building and grounds  
under the supervision and man-  
agement of the Park Board, and  
save ourselves and property this  
rich and beautiful opportunity!  
In the face of the new hotel  
investment, the box factory in-

vestment, the cannery stock sell-  
ing and other activities, the  
money can apparently come in no  
other way.  
Come on fellow citizens, lets  
go, this can and should be done."

**Swiss to Spend 8 Million  
on Electric Rails in '25**  
ZURICH, Jan. 9.—The Swiss  
national railways will spend \$8,-  
000,000 in 1925 to continue the  
work of electrifying the entire  
system of the country, according  
to the Government budget for  
1925.
