Immediately after the stockholders meeting the directors convened and elected officers for the year, which are President, J. P. Dodge, Vice Presidents C. B. Lamkin and Sylvester Patterson, Cashier and Secretary V. O. N. Smith, Assistant Cashiers F. S. Engle and S. A. Peters, Jr., other employees being Chas. W. Robertson, Margaret Van Dyke and Emma Jenkins.

The only change in the officers is the election of Sylvester Patterson to the position of Vice President. C. B. Lamkin, Vice President for several years past, was re-elected to that position, but as he is temporarily absent from the city looking after his interests in northern California, it was deemed wise to elect an additional Vice President, and Mr. Patterson was unanimously chosen for that position. 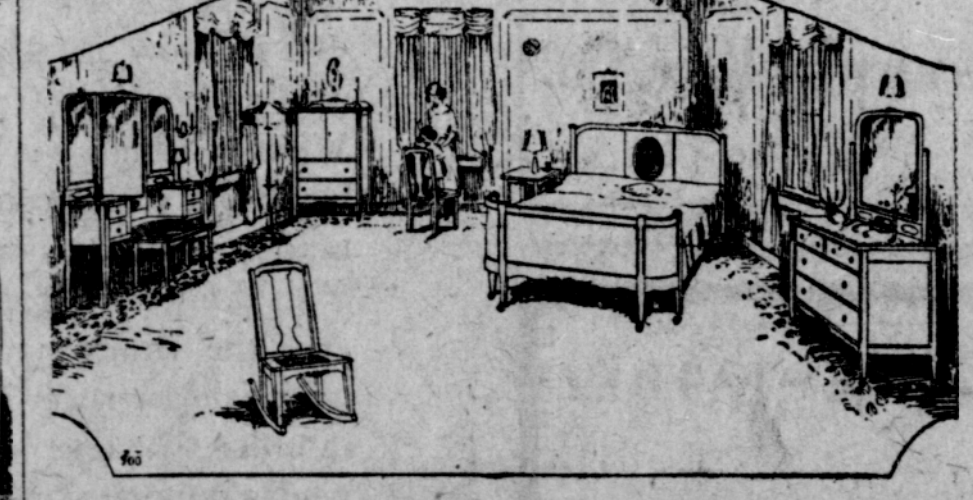

MUCH NEW TRAIL OPENED BY FOREST SERVICE

There were 26 miles of new trail construction completed in the Salmon river country and maintenance work was done on 103 miles of existing trails. This is the largest area in the state without wagon roads and the trails are of vital importance to residents.

In the Marble mountain region eight miles of new trails were built and maintenance work was done on 197 miles of existing trails. This is one of the greatest game refuges in the state and fishing in the mountain lakes cannot be excelled.
