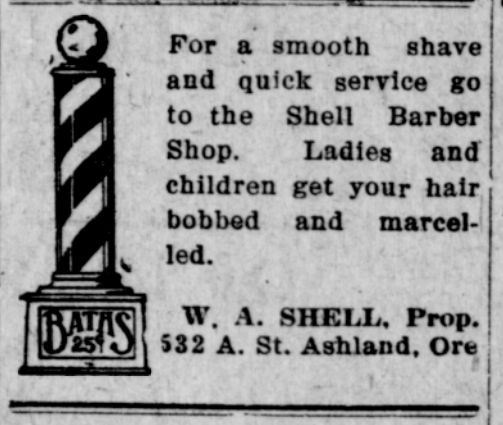

Negotiations for the funding of the \$4,000,000 French war debt to the United States have been begun between Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon and Etienne Clementel, French Minister of Finance. A note sent to Mellon suggests a ten-year moratorium and in the nature of payments. Payments are with interest at one and one-half per cent. "Peggy" Marsh, ex-actress, has married again, according to word from London, the bridegroom being Kald Fenwick, captain of the Royal Horse Guards and lord of the Manor of Witham, in Lincolnshire. Her first husband was Captain Albert L. Johnson, who later made formal announcement of the legal adoption of Henry Field, 2d, grandson of Marshall Field, famous Chicago merchant. Johnson died in New York two years ago. Peggy Marsh's fight in Illinois courts for a share of the Field millions for her young son was attended by world-wide publicity. Unless the United States secures a more adequate air force, an enemy fleet with aircraft would find little difficulty in "walking into New York," Major-General Mason M. Patrick, chief of the army air service, told the House Appropriations Committee in Washington. The army, Patrick said, had but 1,121 airplanes, many of them not fit for service. An epidemic of influenza or gripe, sweeping Belgium with many fatalities, has struck Queen Elizabeth, heroic consort of King Albert. Her condition was reported as "fairly serious." The King himself has been slightly affected and Premier Theunis is reported recovering from an attack of the malady.

And the next night Booth killed Lincoln as he sat in the Presidential box at Ford's Theatre.

Days before the assassination, Booth, Mrs. Surratt and her son, John Surratt, had also sat in the house on H street and evolved a wild plan to kidnap Lincoln; but General Robert E. Lee surrendered the Confederate cause to General Ulysses S. Grant, and it was too late. It was then that Booth, bitter at the loss of the Southern cause, made up his mind to kill Lincoln.

From the time of Lincoln's assassination the house has gradually fallen into decay. Families moved in, but soon moved out; and more and more the rumor spread that the ghost of Mrs. Surratt flitted through the murky interior, passing through closed doors that creaked, and tapping on window panes.

More than two years ago the steps which led up to the second story fell down, and since then the house has been a tumbling, grim reminder of the most tragic event in American history.

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PUZZLES ARE PART OF LATIN COURSE

AUBURN, N. Y., Jan. 15.—Condition: High School students rushing to take Latin, and studying it for hours.

Result: High standings. Cause: Latin cross-word puzzles. Recognition of the cross-word puzzle as a medium of educational value today became an established fact when Latin cross-word puzzles appeared in classes at High School for the first time. Adoption of the new method of instruction for this subject was hailed by students as a revolutionary step.

Should the new idea prove effective in raising the scholastic standard in Latin, the cross-word puzzle may be adopted for use in

other foreign languages, it was stated.

The system in use, one teacher explained, is distribution of puzzles to students to fill out with Latin words. The meaning of the word in English is given, and it is the task of the student to ascertain the meaning of the word in Latin.

Some of the puzzles are constructed largely of simple words, despite the fact that they have a complicated appearance. In order to complete the work on one of the lessons an hour usually is necessary. Thus teachers are sure that their pupils are spending the required amount of study on the subject.

The Latin cross-word twisters are solved much the same as are the English puzzles. Each white space represents a Latin letter. Teachers impress upon the students that they must not spend too much time on the larger words at first. The pupils are advised to get the small words, and these will give leads for the big ones.
