The National Prohibition Anniversary Celebration was held in Medford at the Baptist Church Friday. The meeting presided over by County W. C. T. U. president, Mrs. S. L. Leonard, was greatly enjoyed by all that attended. Mr. Charles Hall who spoke at the Christian Church Friday night addressed the meeting as did also the new district attorney, Newton Chaney. Both speakers were optimistic as to the future. Mr. Hall was a friend of Francis Willard and well acquainted with the national president of W. C. T. U., Miss Anna Gordon. He has faith in the stability of the W. C. T. U. and is very interested in their work.

The Medford union was hostess at a magnificent noon luncheon served in the church basement. A large number of delegates from Grants Pass and Ashland attended the meeting.

D. A. R. Meeting

"Indian Music" was the theme for the program hour at the January meeting of the Mount Ashland Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, with the Misses Poley as hostesses, Friday evening of last week.

Prior to this interesting study, the Regent, Miss Hicks, conducted the beautiful ceremony which is always the opening for each meeting. The business session followed in which reports were given from the various standing and special committees; the one from the budget committee being of particular import. The Americanization work now being done was discussed and suggestions made. Plans were formulated also in reference to the February meeting with Crater Lake Chapter of Medford, the special feature of which is a luncheon at the Blue Flower Inn.

The Regent then asked the chairman of the Program committee, Mrs. C. E. Pell, to take charge of the program, in which Miss Hicks gave a resume of Indian Music, during which Mrs. Vivian M. Woodside sang at intervals, in illustration of the different kinds of songs. In the story given, the speaker told of Indian Music in a general way; of the ones who had conducted research work along definite lines; of the ones aiding and encouraging that effort; of the tribal songs and differentiated in the songs made by men and those of dreams. Every ceremonial had its own song and there were certain songs for certain seasons and events. The Oregon Indians held memorial exercises—every year, in which the "deer dance" with its songs was given in memory of the deceased.

In the beautiful melodies sung by Mrs. Woodside, there were the tribal melodies of the Omahas, "The Ghost Pipes," "Her Blanket," "The Invocation to the Sun God" and a haunting lullaby, "Wium" in which the songs of the Omahas, the Navajo and the Zuni Indians written by Cadman, Troyer and Thurlow Lieurance were used. Each song represented a certain type and rhythm; the flute song, the recitative, the lullaby, all were represented. The stories of these songs and the difficulty

in securing the melodies made interesting hearing. The listeners were especially fortunate in having the sympathetic and beautiful rendering of these melodies by Mrs. Woodside. A vote of appreciation was given by the Chapter. To Miss Hicks also was given appreciative thanks for the splendid paper read, which brought to her hearers the result of many hours of patient research to obtain the delightful story told.

During the social hour, the Misses Lydia McCall, Gladys Applegate, Minnie and Eva Poley served dainty refreshments. Miss Lydia McCall was social chairman for this meeting assisted by Miss Applegate and Miss Minnie Poley.

Golf will be the featured attraction, as there are two fine courses here, and the leading players of the country will appear in the various competitions. There also will be tennis tournaments, baseball games, trap-shooting, and swimming and diving contests, in which Olympic champions and holders of world titles will take part.

A miniature Olympic aquatic carnival for women will be held Sunday, February 8. Girls who already have accepted invitations are: Aileen Riggan, Sybil Rauer, Helen Wainwright, Ethel Lackie, Hartha Dorelius, Agnes Geraghty and Gertrude Ederle. All these stars won points or championship for Uncle Sam at the recent Olympic Games.

The Ormond Beach events will be held in tidal water, and efforts will be made for new world's records over such a course in conformity with the newly adopted rules of the International Swimming Federation.

In the golf tournaments scheduled for this city there are no less than five competitions for women and invitations to attend them have been extended to the foremost women players of the country. Among those invited are: Miss Glenn Collett, Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd and Miss Alexa Stirling, present national champion.

WAR SEQUEL HITS CHINESE STUDENTS

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Jan. 19.— Chinese students at the University of Michigan here are finding an aftermath to the Chinese war in curtailment of funds provided for their education.

In some instances checks from scholarships, such as that established by Tsing Hua College from

the indemnity fund returned at the close of the Boxer rebellion by the United States, have been delayed for more than a month and students forced to seek odd jobs to meet their current expenses.

Ninety Chinese are enrolled in the university. Of this number fifteen are directly dependent upon scholarships furnished from their native land. The Tsing Hua College scholarships furnish \$80 a month to each student.

Students holding "provincial scholarships" from districts where the war has been in progress have been entirely cut off from sources of revenue.

Since the war of Chinese hostilities students have withdrawn practically all of a \$200 reserve fund maintained by the Campus Chinese Club, Chenk S. Cheung, Canton China, club said.

CRIME IN SICILY SPREADING FAST

ROME, Jan. 19. — Crime in Sicily has of late assumed alarming proportions. Murders of individuals have been most frequent, but even these have been put in the shade by the number of crimes against whole families.

One of the most startling of these latter was recently enacted at Santa Maria, a small market town near Palermo, which resulted in eight members of three families being killed and injured. The members of three families nineteen in all, were assembled in a garden in the town when rifle fire was opened upon them by several men concealed outside. Fortunately the trees and shrubs afforded the intended victims some protection, but several fell and the remainder escaped to the adjoining house, where, arming themselves, they opened fire on the attackers who decamped, leaving behind a note declaring that a massacre of the three families would undoubtedly be carried out in the near future.
