Earthquake Returns Whales to Japan

TOKYO, Jan. 19. — Japan's greatest disaster, the earthquake and fire of September, 1923, brought whales back to Tokyo Bay. No whales had been seen in the bay for more than thirty years, but the earthquake is said to have so altered the sea bottom of the bay that the "leviathans of the deep" are again finding it a pleasant place to visit. Fishermen report seeing numerous whales during recent weeks.

LONDON, Jan. 19. — Damaged by incessant vibration caused by heavy traffic on adjoining streets St. Paul's Cathedral is in danger of disintegration, according to Sir Aston Webb, member of a committee which is planning the reconstruction of the cathedral.

Japanese Tax Fails to Stop Imports

TOKYO, Jan. 16.—Japan's tax

of 365 per cent upon imported tobacco has apparently stimulated the consumption of foreign grown smokes, according to the Tobacco Monopoly Bureau.

During the first ten months of 1924 more than 150,000,000 cigarettes were imported, as compared with 39,000,000 during all

of the year 1923. The quality of imported tobacco, however, is declared by the bureau to be much poorer than in previous years.

Besides the 150,000,000 imported cigarettes, the smokers of Japan have burned up 39,700,000,000 of the domestic brands, the monopoly bureau declares.
