Pennsylvania Indian Pottery Unearthed

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Jan. 20.—Forty-three different kinds of potos have been made from 800 fragments of pottery unearthed by Max Schrabist, archaeologist of the Wyoming Historical Society, who has been making excavations at Rock Cabin, on Wyoming Mountain. The pottery was the work of the Lenape tribe of Indians, who frequented this valley. The designs on the vessels vary on nearly every piece.

Several Boy Scouts interested in Indian lore are assisting in the work and Rock Cabin has proved a repository of Indian relics. Mr. Schrabist believes that it was used as an Indian shelter rather than as a permanent habitation of the tribe, which many erroneously believed to be a tribe of the Delawareans.

Aviation Progressing in Czecho-Slovakia

PRAGUE, Jan. 20.—Czecho-Slovakia continues to take great interest in aviation. In the past few months two events have taken place in this field which have stimulated the study of aviation. The first was the international exhibition of aircraft held there, and the second was the recent flight of a selected squadron of airplanes to Rumania and Jugoslavia, the other two members of the Little Entente.

A new air line is soon to be started which is to run down the backbone of this long country from Prague to Uzhorod, the capital of Ruthenia. Prague hopes also to become the radiating center for air routes to Berlin, Warsaw, Vienna and Paris.

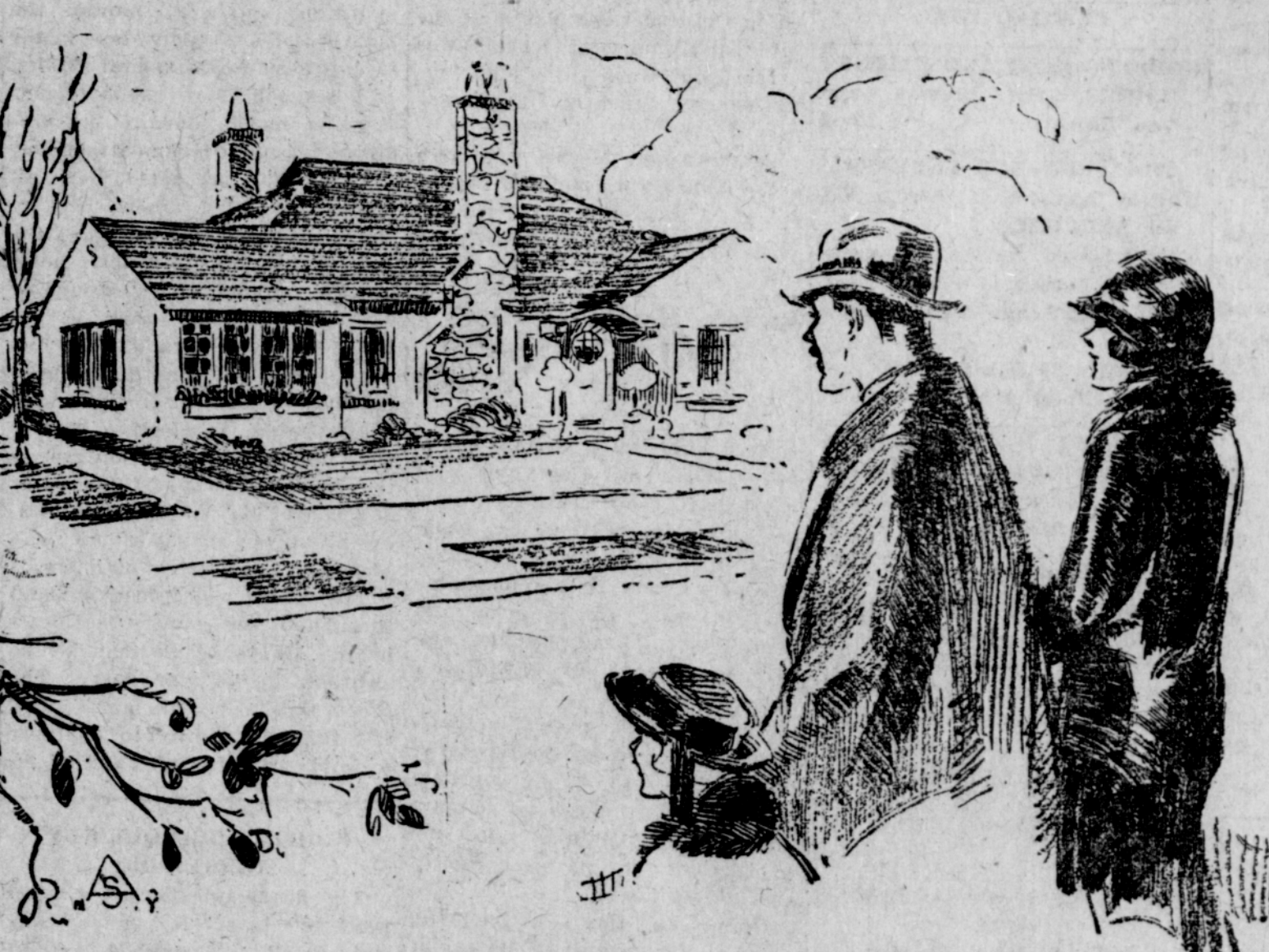
