THE NORMAL SITUATION

Living up to their promises made at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon several weeks ago, the Southern Oregon representatives at the State legislature Tuesday introduced a bill into the house, asking for an appropriation of \$175,000 for the construction of normal school buildings here.

But in promising to do all in their power to obtain a normal for Ashland, the representatives stated that the fight would be a long and a hard one. That fight has just begun, and from now on we must all do everything in our power to aid.

It has been pointed out that most of the young girls who are in training in order that they may in turn train the children, come from the poorer families of the state.

Thus is the state deprived of one of its greatest assets, its teachers, and thus are the young people deprived of an opportunity which should be theirs.

It has been shown that Oregon each year needs 1,000 new teachers. The salaries provided in this state, in comparison with other states, are ridiculously low, and for this reason it is only the younger teachers, the less experienced teachers, and those who will live here, at a lower salary, simply because they like the country, who are our teachers.

STILL REPRESENTED

With the resignation of Judge Coke as a member of the board of regents of the Monmouth State Normal school, residents of Southern Oregon felt our representation on that board was gone.

In our battle for the establishment of a state normal here, it is imperative that we have a man on the Monmouth board, a man capable of real work, for getting the normal bill through the legislature will be a difficult job.

Closely in touch with every civic affair in this section, a real student of educational projects, and a man with wide and varied acquaintance over the entire state, Mr. Fuller is ideally prepared for the position to which he has been appointed.

Ashland should feel proud to have such a man given recognition by the state. We are confident that Mr. Fuller is fully capable, willing and anxious to give his best for the betterment of Ashland and for the betterment of the normal school organization in the state.
