Inheritance, Income Bill Slapped at in Legislative Measure

Inheritance—18 — No tax upon the inheritance or upon the incomes of residents or citizens of Oregon is included in a bill introduced today by Senator Dennis of Union. This controversial measure will be submitted for adoption at the present legislature and submission to the electorate of the whole state at the general election in 1926.

Dennis said he introduced the measure with the hopes of attracting people from the east and middle west to make their home in Oregon and to do business unharassed by constant changing in the tax legislation. He said the plan worked to Florida's advantage. Dennis favored the income tax two years ago, but said the repeal of the law convinced him that the people would never let such a measure become a permanent law.

posed, his face like a mask and his voice firm when entering his plea. In the front row of the crowded court room sat John O'Shea's mother, with tears streaming

down her cheeks and her face half hidden behind a handkerchief. Further back in the audience sat John Taylor's young wife and four-year-old curly headed daughter. Here and there in the audience were seen a number of friends of the defendants, anxiously awaiting their pleas.

Outside the courtroom were scores of curiosity seekers, anxious to gain entrance into the court room to see the four men who are charged with the murder of Oscar Erickson. Court Bailiff Mattson stood at the court room door to prevent an overcrowding of the court room.

The only defendant who had retained an attorney up to this morning was John O'Shea, who was represented by Horace Manning. At the suggestion of each defendant, William Marx was appointed by Judge Leavitt to defend W. S. Pate and William Duncan to represent Pete Sullivan. Taylor, it was understood, did not desire an attorney at this time.

the Southern Pacific freight shed here, removing several tires, part of a shipment consigned to the L. L. Leedom company of this city. He also acknowledged the theft of a cream separator from the Nate High ranch near this city.

These robberies, which occurred several days ago, were reported to the Southern Pacific officials and to the county officers. A search was made for Moss and he was located in Northern California. Upon being returned to this city a search of his property was made by Sheriff Ralph Jennings and the tires and separator were recovered. The tires were found in the creek bottom, where Moss states he threw them to avoid suspicion, while the cream separator was found on the place, in good condition.

A settlement was made out of court yesterday by Moss' father and L. L. Leedom, representing the tire concern and with Nate High. It was for this reason that the light sentence on this charge was imposed.
